JUST SOME FIGURES.

When a snowy day comes and sort of ties up business, Secretary Bare, of the Chamber of Commerce, noses around for facts and figures which he likes to have handy in case he needs them. The other day he reeled off to The Tribune editor a few of his figures, which are considered of sufficient interest to be published, and here they are:

Within the area of Lincoln county, which is 48x54 miles, lie 1,542,285 acres of land, less than one-fifth of which is designated as improved land. This improved land, totalling only 271,447 acres, is valued at a little less than five million dollars, while the 1,270,838 acres of unimproved has a value of somewhat over seven and one-half millions. The value of personal property in the county is a little less than eighteen million dollars, and the town property value is nearly four and one-half millions. Added to this are the railroads and the telegraph and telephone lines, the value of which is placed at about six millions. This makes the total value of all property in Lincoln county forty million dollars in round numbers.

Lincoln county with its 23,420 people ranks seventh in population among the counties of the state. Of these 23,420 more than one-half, or 12,762, live in the towns, leaving 10,658 actually residing on farms. It has been fairly estimated that 14,450 Lincoln county people live in the towns and on the farms which are located in the Platte Valley proper, leaving 8,970 in the towns and on the farms outside the valley.

In acreage Lincoln county is the third largest in the state, exceeded only by Cherry and Custer counties, the latter having but a few more acres than Lincoln. It is by reason of this large acreage that Lincoln county stands close to the head in the number of cattle owned, the total reported last year being nearly sixty-seven thousand head.

There are 6,877 children of school age in the county, 5,207 of whom are enrolled in the schools. The average cost per year per pupil to educate the children of Lincoln county is eighty dollars and fifty-eight cents.

The total tax assessed against the property owners of Lincoln county for the year 1920 was nearly seven hundred thousand dollars, to be exact it was \$697,466. Under the several divisions this is represented as follows: State tax \$83,635, county tax \$120,743, school tax \$419,618, city and village tax \$73,566. This does not include special assessments such as court house, special bridge and irrigation.

The tax levy for the maintenance and operation of the city of North Platte for the current year is \$57,441, and for the North Platte school district it is \$136,842.

Nearly two-thirds of all the taxes we pay as citizens of Lincoln county is for the education of our children and for this reason taxes should be cheerfully and promptly paid, for the child's greatest asset is its education.

Some day we will ask Secretary Bare to reel off some more facts and figures.
