**NORTH PLATTE BOY, MAKING GOOD IN OLD MEXICO, WRITES OF CONDITIONS**

Mata Redonda, Ver. Mex., January 31st, 1921.  
Editor Tribune,  
North Platte, Nebraska.

Dear Sir:—  
Inclosed herewith please find a check for \$2.00 as payment for one year's subscription to the Semi-Weekly Tribune.

It is rather hard to get any news from the States in these parts, so it is through your thriving paper that I will try to keep in touch with the people at home.

I have been here in Mexico for a little better than four months, and like it pretty well. I am employed at the Mata Redonda Terminal of the Transcontinental Oil Co. (Standard Oil), as an office clerk, and have been acting Camp Boss for some three months, this work being in conjunction with my office work. I had a relief from New York last month, but he did not seem to get along with the Chinamen in the hotel, so after a few had quit their jobs he was fired and of course the job fell back into my hands, and bids well to stay for some time as they have made no effort to secure another relief.

The Mata Redonda Terminal like several others close by, resembles a small railroad shop town, with their shops and office buildings and brick cottages. The terminal is situated on the beach, and loads oil tankers through pipe lines running about a mile out in the Gulf. We are able to load twenty-five to thirty ships a month, or about 2,000,000 barrels of oil, and expect to be able to load on an average of 4,000,000 barrels within the coming year.

The wells are situated in the foothills some 35 kilometers distance and the oil is pumped through lines to tanks at this terminal. There are numerous oil fields from which oil is taken in this part of the country. The big fields being, Zacamixtilte, Amatlan, Chihnampa, Los Naranjos and the Tepelate near Taxpam. All Northern Mexico is in the midst of a great oil development. Extending from the Tepelate district to Los Naranjos district is a broad oil belt forty-five miles in length and all along that belt there is development on a large scale.

Mexico, however, is not a small man's field. It requires large capital to develop oil properties here and for that reason only big companies like the Texas, Atlantic Refining, Standard Oil, Gulf Refining and Agulla can afford to enter the field. Wells in Mexico run down about 2,200, and it costs anywhere from \$50,000 to \$70,000 to put down a well. So you can readily see that the man with small capital has no chance at all.

Native labor is inexpensive, costing about 4 pesos (\$2.00) a day. Expert drillers and other experienced labor get much higher prices, of course.

Speaking of Mexico's future as an oil producer to date has scarcely more than touched the edge of the possibilities. The country is the world's oil storehouse for the future. Geologists are divided as to whether Mexican oil occurs in "crevices" or "pools," but there can be no doubt as to the vastness of the supply and the fact that the territory is hardly more than scratched.

At present Mexico is witnessing a big influx of American labor. Tampico is the headquarters of all the companies in northern Mexico. Americans are coming in by the hundreds and all have the opinion that they will get a big job the minute they get off the train, and consequently most of them will loaf around the saloons and spend all their money before investigating conditions. So it comes to pass that we meet any number of Americans broke, and without a job, and in

fact most of them do get a job at all and have to be shipped back to the States at the government's expense. A few men get down into the oil fields and go from one company camp to another seeking work, and are a nuisance in the most cases. It is my duty to look after these unfortunates when they are in camp, provided we can furnish them sleeping quarters. Consequently I have at times had to turn some away; some go on about their business, but the majority argue and raise an awful fuss. It is my opinion that the big part of them are social outcasts.

I am at present planning on returning to the University of Nebraska providing nothing happens between now and September.

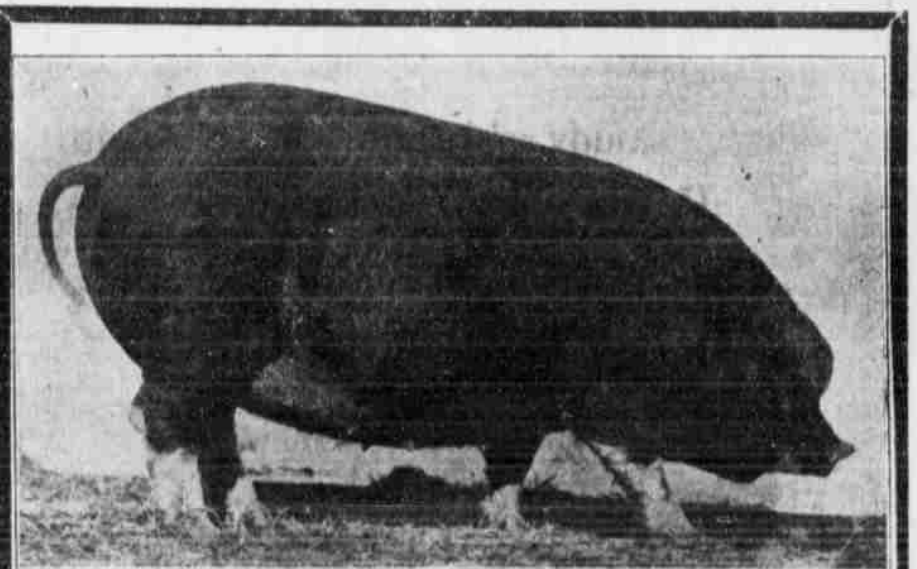
"I offer to each one of you," he says, before the command to fire is given, "a policy of accident insurance as a protection against the possible death or disability which faces you."
