**OBITUARY.**

Henry J. Effenbeck was born in Elvesten, Ill., May 5, 1876. When he was seventeen the family moved to Hays Center, Nebr., where the boy engaged to carry the overland mail and stage route to Palisade, Nebr. When the drought of the early nineties came he returned to Illinois but later he returned to Nebraska and married Miss Carrie Young of Superior.

Mr. and Mrs. Effenbeck were the parents of nine children of whom eight survive—the father. They are Mrs. Harry Taylor of this city, Mrs. Peter Paul of Maxwell and Luther, Lela, Anna, Henry, Fern and Leora who are at home.

In 1914 the family moved to Provo, Utah where Mr. Effenbeck had charge of the construction of the big dam in Provo river in connection with the Bridal Veil Falls. Five years later they returned to Nebraska, settling at Deshler where he took up carpenter work. Later they moved to a farm near Deshler where they lived for 8 years. In 1918 they came to Maxwell, Nebr., and bought a farm three miles north of that place. Here it was found that he was affected with a cancer and in the hope of bettering his health they moved to a sandhill farm, twelve miles north east of this city. Radium treatments and operations were of no avail and it was on this farm that he passed away.

Besides his bereaved wife and family he leaves his father, William Effenbeck of Morris, Minn., a sister, Mrs. C. A. Overman of Sidney, four brothers, Hlo of Morris, Minn., Will of Lincoln, Carl of Chester, Nebr. and John of Maxwell and a large number of friends.
