LOCAL FARM BUREAU WORKER IS BACK AFTER A THREE WEEK CAMPAIGN IN NEBRASKA.

Aaron S. Gregg, sent by the Lincoln County Farm Bureau to represent Lincoln County in the School of Instruction and some of the intensive campaigns which the State Farm Bureau is carrying on, returned Friday night to North Platte. He was gone three weeks. He first went to Lincoln where he took instruction with a large number of other farmers, in the objects and activities of the Farm Bureau movement. Upon completing this course he went with sixteen other farmers to David City, county seat Butler County where a campaign for memberships was carried on for a week. Over 500 members were secured. From there twelve men went into Cuming County, making West Point the headquarters. It was here that Mr. Gregg made a reputation as a worker, he being a high man on the team in securing memberships during the campaign. He next went into Colfax County with Schuyler as headquarters and this campaign was not finished when Mr. Gregg left. He is more than enthusiastic about the work and says the State Manager is planning on putting on a campaign in Lincoln County as soon as possible. It was suggested that the middle of March would be a good time but there are good reasons why it should not be started that soon. Mr. Gregg will make a report to the Executive Board of the Lincoln County Farm Bureau at its meeting.
