LINCOLN COUNTY CHAPTER OF AMERICAN RED CROSS IS ACTIVE

The Executive Committee of the Lincoln County Chapter, American Red Cross met at the office of the president, Miss Anna Kramph, Tuesday afternoon, February 22 and spent some time in considering the possible activities to be undertaken during the coming year. The following chairmen of committees were elected: Committee on Auxiliary Service, Mrs. Chas. Bogue; Committee on Home Service, Miss Anna Kramph; Committee on Nursing, Mrs. R. F. Cotterell; Junior Red Cross Committee, Supt. Aileen G. Cochran. Each of these chairmen was given authority to appoint the members of her own committee. Mrs. Killen, of Wallace, was made Vice-Chairman of the Committee on Auxiliary Service. The salary of the secretary of the Lincoln County Chapter was set at \$25 a month. The Chapter will undertake to make some arrangements to equip for disaster relief, but plans have not been worked out yet. An appropriation was made and placed in the hands of the officers to be used in helping to defray the expense of maintaining a paid social worker in the county.
