COUNTRY BOYS ARE NOT BARRED FROM BOY SCOUT ACTIVITIES

Every rural boy may become a Boy Scout even though he does not reside near a Scout Troop. The Scout Executive, Wm. M. Barrball, at North Platte, describes the following procedure for those boys who can not attend the regular troop meetings: Any boy over twelve years of age may become an Associate Scout by enrolling in a Troop either at North Platte, or in the town nearest his home. He joins just as any other Scout paying the registration fee of fifty cents, which is for one year. He is required to attend only one meeting per year. If the boy prefers he may send his enrollment directly to the Scout Executive. In this case he will be assigned to some Troop.

Pastors and others interested in boys are being urged to communicate with the North Platte Council in view of organizing Troops in all communities. Every church in Lincoln County should adopt Scouting for its boy program. "A Scout Troop in Every Church" is the slogan.

You will be heartily welcome. There is room for all. COME.

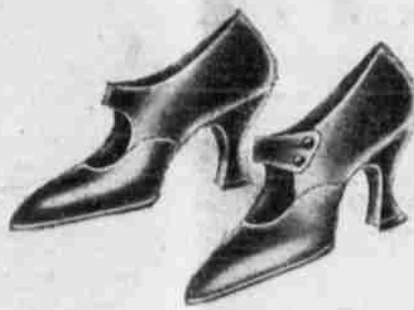
