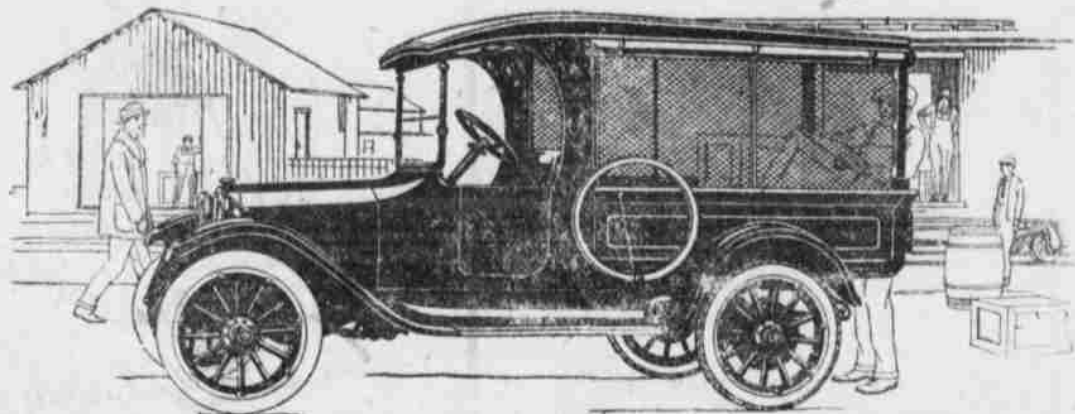

AHEAD OF US

The form for the Henningson Engineering Co. arrived the first of the week to begin work on the laying of the extension water mains of which there are to be about twenty blocks. The well for the auxiliary pumping plant was put in last fall and the pump house is ready. The water mains will be completed inside of sixty days and the auxiliary plant will soon be in operation.—Gothenburg Times.

PRICE FOR BEETS

As near as can be learned at this time the price per ton for beets this year will be as follows:

The sliding scale contract which will be offered will provide for a payment of 75c per ton above the average price per 100 pounds of sugar of the 1921 crop. Minimum price \$5.50 per ton.

The flat rate contract will be \$6.50 per ton.

It is said that the price of labor this year will be \$25.—Sutherland Courier.

SALVATION ARMY OFFICER VISITS LINCOLN COUNTY ADVISORY BOARD

Commandant Alfreida Swanson of the Iowa-Nebraska Division of the Salvation Army was in North Platte the last of the week for the purpose of settling up the home service campaign in Lincoln County for 1920. While she was here a meeting of the Advisory Board was held and T. O. Swenson, treasurer was instructed to send the balance on hand to J. D. Gamble Omaha, who is treasurer of the Nebraska state fund. The Commandant explained that the Salvation Army Rescue and Maternity Home will be erected on the Ex-Governor Sanders property. She stated that this home is placing from 83 to 85 out of each hundred girls that it shelters in the time of need into responsible positions where they fill their places in a creditable manner. "The Salvation Army is very grateful to the advisory board and to the people of Lincoln County for the generous support of its work in mending broken humanity," said the Commandant.
