'Noel E. Bullock, noted aviator of will leave today for Wyoming after Madrid, Nebraska, arrived at Bardfordsville in his machine Tuesday morning and is spending a few days with his uncles, R. M. and W. M Chelf. He was accompanied by Mis Valora Romanza Nelson, who is said to hold the only woman expert pilot

license in the world. Mr. Bullock and Miss Nelson left Chicago for this county last Saturday but on account of the weather they were forced to spend a few days on the way. Engine trouble developed near Springfield and they were detain ed there for a while. They flew over Lebanon enroute to Bradfordsville Tuesday morning. Mr. Bullock is not and has been connected with Davis Bullock Aero Co., of North Platt Nebr., since its organization a little over a year ago. Although only 26 years old he is rated as one of the bes qualified flyers in the country. He is said to have made more consecutive loops after the first few hours he had flown than any other man. His brother Ward Bullock, has frequently been visitor at Bradfordsville and has many friends there
