INTERESTING ACCOUNT OF THE TRAVELS OF WELL KNOWN LOCAL AVIATOR

The following account is a clipping from the Lebanon, Kentucky, Enterprise and will be of interest to many people who knew the aviator named.

"Noel E. Bullock, noted aviator of Madrid, Nebraska, arrived at Bardfordsville in his machine Tuesday morning and is spending a few days with his uncles, E. M. and W. M. Chief. He was accompanied by Miss Valora Romanza Nelson, who is said to hold the only woman expert pilot license in the world.

Mr. Bullock and Miss Nelson left Chicago for this county last Saturday but on account of the weather they were forced to spend a few days on the way. Engine trouble developed near Springfield and they were detained there for a while. They flew over to Lebanon enroute to Bardfordsville Tuesday morning. Mr. Bullock is now and has been connected with Davis-Bullock Aero Co., of North Platte, Nebr., since its organization a little over a year ago. Although only 29 years old he is rated as one of the best qualified flyers in the country. He is said to have made more consecutive loops after the first few hours he had flown than any other man. His brother Ward Bullock, has frequently been a visitor at Bardfordsville and has many friends there.

A Nebraska paper speaking of Miss Nelson in a recent issue contained the following: "Mr. Bullock is carrying with him Miss Valora Romanza Nelson. Miss Nelson holds the only woman expert pilot license in the world and is known as the 'woman stunt aviator.'" Such trifles as looping loops, Immelman turns, barrel rolls, tail spins and 22,000 feet ascensions are common to her."

Mr. Bullock says that flying is not so dangerous as many believe and declares that nearly all accidents are the result of stunt flying. He said that but a short time ago his father thought any one who would go up in a plane was a fit subject for the foolish house but that now since he has flown several times his opinion was entirely changed.
