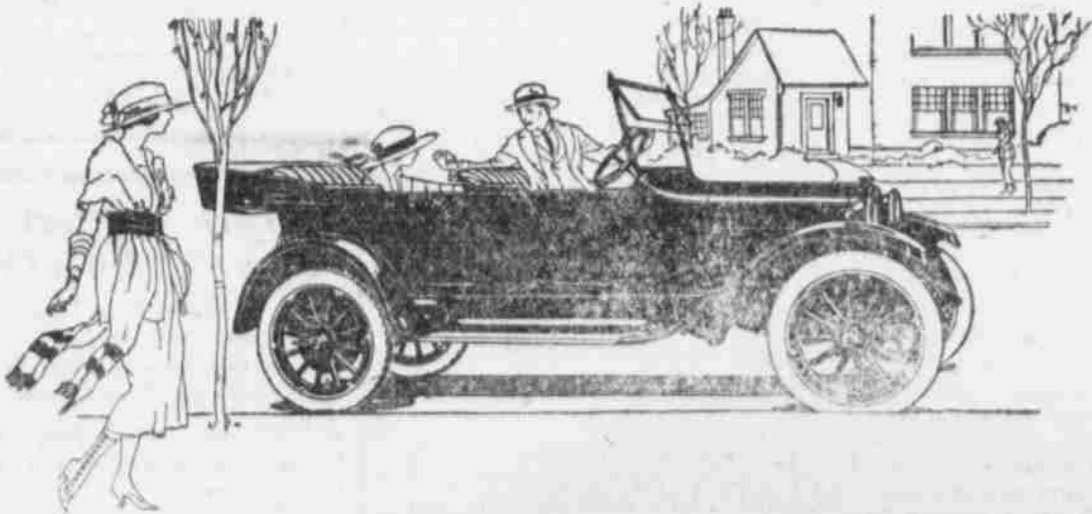

### UNANIMOUS APPROVAL GIVEN PLAN OF GRAIN MARKETING COMMITTEE OF SEVENTEEN

District meetings in the 25 leading grain producing states during the past two weeks have given the Committee of Seventeen every assurance that the grain marketing plan as outlined at each of the meetings, would be endorsed at the national meeting to be held at Chicago, April 16, when 107 delegates selected at the state meetings will gather together.

Concerning the Nebraska Convention one writer says editorially:

"Eight hundred Nebraska farmers representing the various organizations with four negative votes went on record as favoring the marketing plan outlined by the grain marketing Committee of Seventeen."

The above quotation from the daily press in regard to the district meeting when seven delegates were chosen from Nebraska to consider the proposed plan of the grain marketing committee, does not begin to give the sentiment which was manifested on that day.

In the first place the Nebraska meeting was by far the most enthusiastic and largest of any of the series of meetings held during the week. Members of the Committee of Seventeen who had charge made arrangements for 150 farmers and representatives of farm organizations. Much to their surprise in the neighborhood of 800 attended.

In the face of the large attendance it might be only natural to think that it was the outcome of two factions working among the farmers in an attempt to carry the voting power of the meeting. But the attendance was not the result of a difference of opinion nor were those present curious spectators. Every man present was the legitimate representative of one or more constructive organizations existing in the state for the good of the farmer.

When one farmer arose in the midst of those present and, in order to get the sentiment of the hundreds present, made a motion that a favorable endorsement be given the plan, a hush fell over the hall. The chairman ruled the motion in order and called for a vote. The voice of over seven hundred eyes sounded down the hotel lobby, four men voted against accepting the plan.

It was plainly evident that the farmers had not come to air their personal opinions or to take part in any conflict but to secure first hand information and to pledge their support to the greatest agrarian movement that has ever been taken in this country. Those opposed to the constructive and economic advancement of agriculture were not present. Every question asked and every opinion stated came from the heart. The members of the various organizations have a common marketing problem to solve and it was clearly evident from this first meeting that the farmers of the state are ready to join hands and to put some

workable scheme through to perfection. If the proposed plan is accepted at Chicago next week, Nebraska will stick to the end.

### SENIOR CLASS OF HIGH SCHOOL TO GIVE PLAY BEFORE GRADUATION

The Class of 1921 of the North Platte High School will present "The Fortune Hunter" as the Senior Class Play. It will probably be given on May 11th at the Keith. Miss Leaha Jones of the School of Expression of the University of Nebraska has been secured to coach the play. It is said that the Class of 1921 has unusual talent and that the prospects are good for one of the best amateur productions that have ever been given by the local school.
