Campaigns in other counties have been followed by a very large increase in demands for Pig and Calf Club work. The Calf Club should be stared at once and all of those interested in it can forward their names and addresses to the County Agent. The Pig Club work can be started as late as the 1st of May but we would like to have your enrollment now. It will also be possible for you to have a Sheep Club. which may start June 1st. All of these animals must be purebred and preferably females. The calves should be between 8 and 12 months old, pigs between 8 and 12 weeks, sheep between 8 and 12 months old. They must all be shown at some Fair and records for cost of gains must be

Any boy or girl between the ages of 10 and 19 years will be permitted to ake up this work

It would be well for you to borrow the money and get the business experience that goes with the practical work for breeding and caring for your animal. We should have five or more members for each breed of animals and if you are interested, get the names together as soon as possible and send them to the County Agricultural Agent, Box 233, North Platte.
