STATE OF NEBRASKA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.
APRIL 13, LINCOLN, NEB.
CHANGE IN MOTOR VEHICLE LAWS.

TO COUNTY TREASURER:—
On this date, the Governor signed H. R. 344 and H. R. 345 the former being amended motor vehicle law and the latter the law relative to the expenditure of the motor vehicle tax. I intend getting out a pamphlet soon, with the complete laws therein but for your immediate information, I wish to set out the most important changes in the laws. Both bills carried the emergency and are now laws.

H. R. 345.

Treasurers, instead of sending to the State Treasurer, 75% of the total collections must now remit only 3 1/2 per cent of the total collections. Starting with the opening of business April 13th, the Treasurer shall retain 96 1/2 per cent of the total collections. The County Board and the State Department of Public Works shall prepare a budget which will decide upon a certain amount needed for maintenance on the State Highway System. This amount, the County Treasurer will set aside in the State Highway Fund of the County. It must not exceed 75 per cent of the total collections. The balance is to be credited to the County road dragging fund.

All claims for maintenance work are to be handled as any other county claim. One Division Engineers, in their regular visits to the County Treasurer will approve the claims and they may then be paid from the State Highway Fund. Do not send any more claims to the Division Engineers. Hold them until he approves them in your office.

The treasurer shall also pay vouchers drawn on the State Highway Fund by our Department for all plates and containers used in each county. This will not be of consequence this year as nearly all plates are paid for, except the few dealer plates which are ordered from time to time.

H. R. 344.

On all dealer's applications after April 12, 1921, a fee of ten (\$10) Dollars must be paid for extra plates instead of one (\$1.00) Dollar as was previously required.

After December 31st, 1921, plates will be furnished in pair and one must be carried on the front of every car. Treasurers must now charge a fee of \$1.00 on applications for a container to replace lost ones. As before, a container will be furnished free with the first applications.

The new law requires County Treasurers to send application to us in duplicate, and to furnish applicants with a combined certificate and receipt and requires us to pay county Treasurers for any work they do which our Department is supposed to do.

Ninety-five per cent of the money which treasurers have sent in and which is unexpended in the State Treasurer's office will be returned to the County from which it came. The return of the money to the Counties must be done by voucher and I do not know what the State Treasurer will require. This should be credited to the State Highway Fund. A good many treasurers have not been sending in their entire 75 per cent and in as much as the State is entitled to five per cent of all money collected up to April 13th, you should make a dividing line between the collections received before and after that date. You will be notified later how to take care of this. Under separate cover, we are returning original claims for all unpaid vouchers which we have on hand. These should be paid from your State Highway Fund when it is set up.

A provision was also passed giving dealers of new cars the right to transport cars, (solely for the purpose of delivery) from one place to another with a paper "IN TRANSIT" sign. The dealer may also, in case he sells a car, attach a paper number, which will enable the purchaser to drive the car home. These paper numbers are good for ten days only and the purchaser must apply within that time for a regular plate. We are preparing samples of these numbers and will see that you are supplied with them. Dealers must have their own printed, however, and they will

receive such instructions.

Use of 1921 Certificate.

Quite a few transfers have been made where the parties thereto have not made the proper use of the certificate. The upper part is to be presented by a party who has transferred his old car and desires to place his number on a recently obtained car. It must be accompanied by a dealers transfer in case he buys a new car, or a "transfer record" in case he buys an old car. It is only good for ten days. If he applies after ten days he must pay the full fee instead of \$1.00.

The lower part or "Transfer record" is a bill of sale for used cars and must be given to the County Treasurer when the owner applies for registration.

No applicant should have the whole certificate. When the transfer is made, it should be cut in two and each party of the transfer should take his part for further use. We have had cases where a party desiring to have his plate transferred has complained that the party who bought his old car took the whole certificate and he had nothing to show the Treasurer when he made application. If you should receive a whole certificate from someone, please see that the other party gets his own part.
