EDITORIAL.

Dean Chas. Fordyce who is visiting the North Platte schools yesterday and today and giving the educational and group intelligence tests to the pupils, is one of the great national figures in standard group tests. We have known him for a long time and have repeatedly been inspired by his personality and his clear thinking. As a teacher and head of the department of education in Wesleyan University

he came in direct contact with young men and women and at that time did his greatest personal work. Later he was taken to the University of Nebraska, where as head of one of the great departments he has so little direct contact with the students that only a few now come to know him intimately and to love him. But it is here that he has made his scientific investigations along measurement lines and it is here that his value to society as a whole has been recognized. North Platte is honored in the present visit of Dr. Fordyce and will be glad to be so honored many times in the future.

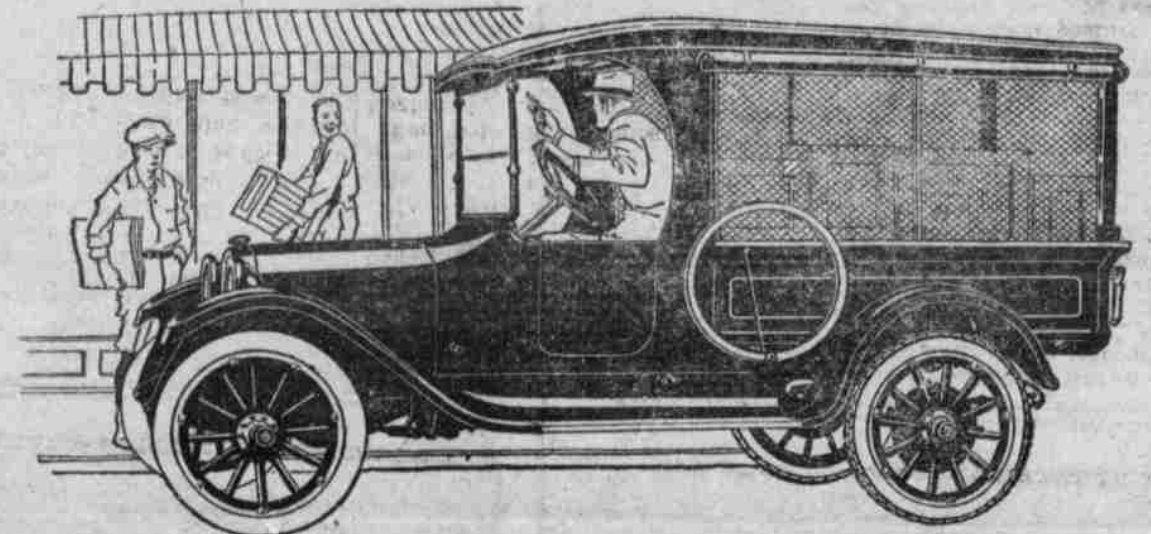
