

OF INTEREST TO COUNTRY FOLKS

FARM BUREAU NEWS SERVICE SUPPLIES ITEMS FOR THE TRIBUNE READERS

Gage county maintained a good lead in the Gift-Corn campaign in Nebraska when a total of 7966 bushels was reported by F. C. Chocker, of Filley, director of the project in this county. Cars were requisitioned and the corn is now on the way to the starving people of Europe and the Near East. It has been estimated that 5 bushels of corn would save the life of a child. Gage county takes the credit of saving nearly 1800 children. This project is closing with a rush in the corn belt states.

An expert potato grower located at Spurgeon, Colorado, 22 miles from the nearest railroad, was recently visited by a delegation of Farm Bureau members from Scotts Bluff county, consisting of A. C. Morrison, C. C. Parrish, L. A. Montz and Agricultural Agent Phil Sheldon. Mr. Spurgeon whose name was given to the town has given years of study to the potato industry. Seed from his fields test 100 per cent under the Colorado certification law and are 99 per cent free from disease. Despite his isolated place he is receiving the very top price for his seed.

Nebraska University was the first institution in the United States to start Co-operative Marketing Courses, but since a request was sent out by J. R. Howard, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, asking the different colleges and universities to include such work in their curriculum, several favorable replies have been received, expressing the keenest interest in such courses. Thirteen schools give definite assurances that this work will be offered and twelve report that they have already made plans for such training.

In the neighborhood of 500 new members were secured in the farm bureau campaign held in Thayer county a week ago, according to the report of J. N. Norton, Chairman of the Organization Committee. J. A. Crawford, of Beardsley, Kansas, formerly campaign manager in Nebraska spoke at several meetings during the week. Mr. Norton said that the clean-up campaigns had been conducted the past week in Butler, Otoe, Gage, Lincoln and Scotts Bluff counties.

Opposition to the daylight saving bill, sponsored by the United States Chamber of Commerce has been taken by the executive committee of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation. This action was taken at the last meeting of the board. The bill as proposed favors daylight saving five months in the year.

The offer of the Farmers' Union State Exchange to give wholesale prices

to all farm bureau precinct secretaries in communities where there is no Union store was unanimously accepted by the executive committee of the state federation, and word to this effect has been sent to the county bureaus.

The Hereford breeders of Webster county met recently and after hearing M. B. Posson, Extension Specialist, adopted a constitution and by-laws for a county association. The following officers for the ensuing year have been elected: Frank Bean, Red Cloud, president; Earl Mattock, Bladen, vice-president; P. H. Sarriek, Bladen, secretary.

Jesse Robertson of Madison county a member of the farm bureau, says that flint corn is more desirable for hogging down than the ordinary varieties of dent corn. Mr. Robertson tried this out for several years, before changing to flint corn entirely for hogging. He says that the hogs would go for the flint corn and leave the dent corn until the last.

Dawson county will have its first crop of soy beans this fall. C. T. White of Grant precinct and Wm. Shackley are giving the bean a try out. They expect to plant them with corn and hog them off this fall. It is thought that soy beans are adapted to soil conditions in this county.

A great deal of interest has been taken in the pig clubs organized in Saunders county. Four clubs are now formed with local leaders in charge. One of the Wahoo clubs has 15 members. Some of the things discussed at the club meetings are: disease control, forage crops, balanced rations, self-feeders, hog killers and judging. Carl Jones, assistant state leader, will be in the county the fore part of May.
