NORTH PLATTE WINS IN CLASS A OF DISTRICT TRACK MEET.

The local track team won first honors at the District Meet which was held Saturday in Kearney by a total score of 31 2-3 points. Seven teams competed in Class A consisting of Broken Bow, Grand Island, Aurora, Kearney and Gothenburg. Locke was especially strong in the 100 yards where he took first honor. Trexler winning fourth.

Trexler won first in the 440 yard run by beating the state record by 2-5 of a second. Hinman followed second by a distance of twelve feet and the next man was twenty feet behind Hinman.

Locke won second in the shot put, throwing 37 feet 3 inches.

Shaner won the pole vault in 19 feet 4 inches.

Locke disqualified in the hurdles on account of knocking over three instead of two.

Schultz took third in discus throwing.

Up to the relay race Broken Bow was ahead of No. Platte in points and North Platte was given the 4th lane which was a distinct disadvantage. The Broken Bow man was given a 20 yd. lead but Locke passed him and lead to the end by 6 inches, thus winning the meet for North Platte.
