



## AN INTERESTING EXPERIMENT IN KILLING DANDELIONS TO BE TRIED HERE.

T. Murphy, foreman of the B. & N. department for so many years has asked permission of the County Commissioners to try an experiment in killing the dandelions on a small part of the lawn about the court house. He proposes to mark off a small place and treat the grass and dandelions to a dose of something or other which he says will kill the dandelions and leave the grass alive. He says the grass blades will turn dark but that the roots are unharmed and they will send up green blades in a short time but the dandelions will never recover. It is understood that Commissioner Cochran will give the necessary permission and the experiment will be tried out. It has been suggested that if the trial proves the merits of the treatment, the city should treat the dandelions along the streets and alleys and require every lot to be cleared of dandelions by that or some other method. The experiment will be watched with much interest by every citizen who has tried to combat the dandelion evil.
