

COUNTY SCHOOL GRADUATES

LARGE CLASS OF RURAL AND VILLAGE SCHOOL PUPILS TO RECEIVE DIPLOMAS.

One of the largest classes in the history of Lincoln County will be graduated from the Eighth Grades on Saturday, May 28th. Each rural and village school in the County has been asked by County Superintendent Aileen G. Cochran to prepare its eighth grade pupils to take the uniform state examinations. These questions were sent out in the early spring and the papers have been corrected. Those who passed the examination with satisfactory grades are to be given certificates of graduation from the Eighth Grades of Lincoln County entitling them to enter any ninth grade in the state of Nebraska. These certificates have been prepared and will be presented to the boys and girls at the exercises Saturday.

The program begins at 2 p. m. at the Franklin Auditorium. It is opened with an invocation by Rev. W. H. Moore and closes with America. The class address is to be made by Miss Anna Kramph and the presentation of diplomas by Aileen G. Cochran, County Superintendent. A number of recitations and musical numbers make up a varied program. One of the interesting features will be the presentation of the History medal from the Daughters of American Revolution. This will be awarded by Mrs. Daisy Hinman to the pupil who stood highest in the study of American History in the whole county, not including North Platte.

The exercises are free and everyone is invited.

NUMBER OF HUNGRY MEN AT PEOPLE'S MISSION SHOWS SLIGHT DECREASE.

The weekly report of Rev. J. B. Payne, in charge of the People's Mission Free Lunch shows that during the week ending May 22 he served 364 meals or an average of 52 a day. For the previous week he served 417 meals or 59 a day. This is a falling off of over fifty meals for the week and indicates that those who predicted that all the hungry men in the country would flock to North Platte, were wrong. The number is large yet but shows a slight falling off.
