EDITORIAL

With the price reduced to \$1.50 a year and twelve pages this issue we think we are surely giving the subscribers full value for their money.

The editor acknowledges his modesty in commenting on the winner of the D. A. R. medal for proficiency in history. Usually he appreciates any evidence of scholarship and when that evidence is within his own family, he can be pardoned a certain pride in the achievement. There is no reason why a school girl should fail to receive editorial mention just because she is the daughter of the editor and someone would say something nasty. It is an honor to have won first place among more than a hundred of one's associates and we are willing to give her mother the entire credit for our daughter's intelligence, but we are proud that she bears our name.

There are numerous societies and club organizations in North Platte whose accomplishments in the course of the year, are unsatisfactory to the membership. This is chiefly because the aims of the organizations have not been lived up to. Some of these organizations have high sounding titles and spend their whole time in looking after the details of the organization without accomplishing anything worthy of the trouble. It has been suggested that there is a chance for constructive work at the City Library. This institution is owned and operated by the taxpayers of North Platte. If it is a good library it will be because the taxpayers give it liberal support. The cost of books has gone sky-high. This cost will be long in reduction for economic causes over which the library has no control. The revenue does not increase as the cost of upkeep has increased. Consequently there is less money to spend for books and as fewer books are being purchased, if some of these societies mentioned above would take it upon themselves to collect books, pamphlets, and magazines for the library it would be work done in a good cause and highly appreciated by the men and women of the Library Board. However, before starting out, the library officials should be consulted so that the more important needs of the institution can be realized and met where possible. Work along this line, if done in a co-operative way would justify the existence of some organizations, which seem to have no other aim than just exist.

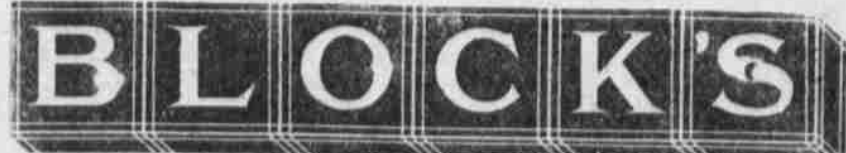
