

NEW LODGE TO BE ORGANIZED

NORTH PLATTE SELECTED FOR ONLY LODGE OF THE ORDER IN NEBRASKA.

Odd Fellows are every where. They are about as numerous as the members of any other lodge and they are a fine bunch of men but they have taken things too seriously according to some of their grand officers, so as a means of diversion a new degree has been instituted for Odd Fellows only. It is the Imperial Order of Muscovites. And there can only be one lodge of this order in any one state. Nebraska has not had a Muscovite lodge so far but W. V. Hoagland of this city has been a member of the Imperial Order for the United States and he was asked to organize a lodge at some point in Nebraska. He naturally chose North Platte as the seat of the order and here it will be. Odd Fellows from every part of the state will be members of the Kremlin Kolo, Imperial Order of Muscovites of North Platte, Nebraska.

The new lodge is to be organized here Friday, June 17 with officers of the grand lodge in attendance. These officers will be on their way to one of the provinces of Canada to institute a branch there and they will stop off at North Platte and put on the ceremonies here that will make this the leading center of Nebraska Odd fellow ship. W. V. Hoagland is to be the first Czar of the Nebraska Muscovites with C. M. York as Minister of Records and E. S. Davis as Minister of Finance. It will be a big day for North Platte with fifty or sixty of her local Odd Fellows up for initiation and probably three times that many from out of town here for the same purpose. A live bear will accompany the grand officers and a parade will be held during the day.

PEOPLES MISSION FREE LUNCH RUNNING SHORT OF FUNDS.

Three hundred and fifty-two meals were served last week by Messrs. Payne and Flynn at the Peoples Mission. These meals were given to men out of work who were going through North Platte. At the close of the week the supplies had been so far exhausted that practically no foods were on hand and only about three dollars, in money. Secretary BaFe of the Chamber of Commerce turned over the proceeds of the base ball game yesterday which netted \$38.30. The number of men who seek food at the mission is decreasing every week but the decrease is so slight that North Platte citizens cannot afford to allow the Mission to close for want of funds. A PIONEER IS COMING

NORTH PLATTE TO BE VISITED BY MISSIONARY BISHOP OF EARLY DAYS.

Fifty-four years ago this year Daniel Sylvester Tuttle was consecrated a Missionary Bishop and started west to take charge of his district which included several of the mountain states. He reached North Platte on June 9, 1867 and found that this was the terminus of the Union Pacific at that time. He must go on so he transferred to a stage coach and made the trip to Julesburg, but the stage was attacked by Indians on the way and two of the party lost their lives. On account of Indian trouble he could not go any farther so he returned to North Platte and spent some time here. In one of his books he tells of securing a rifle and spending considerable time here at target practice. When his party again set out they carried twenty-five rifles and 4,000 rounds of ammunition. As soon as possible they went to Denver and from there to his new field. That was fifty-four years ago. Since then he has been called to other positions in the church until today he is presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church in America.

On Thursday, June 9, he will arrive in North Platte on the same railroad he came on fifty-four years ago. He will survey the scenes as they are today and recall the scenes of that early day. He will be banqueted and honored as far as the local church and the citizens of the city are able to honor him. The next day he will again cover the same trip he made fifty-four years ago but under the comforts of modern railway travel. In his party this time will be a score of lesser bishops and church dignitaries who are journeying to Denver to consecrate Rev. Frederick Ingley, Bishop Coadjutor of Colorado. North Platte people feel honored in this visit which is attracting attention all over the country.
