In its work in the interests of better rural health, the State College of Agriculture Extension Service has published for free distribution a circular on the concrete vault sanitary privy. A large number of farmers are installing septic tanks or other improved methods of sewage disposal. The circular on the sanitary privy gives full specifications on the construction of a modern concrete outdoor toilet.

"Some Nebraska Birds and How to Know Them" is the name of an interesting circular recently issued by the State College of Agriculture Extension Service. It deals with the characteristics of a number of Nebraska birds, and should be especially interesting to those who find delight in this sort of recreation. Several women's clubs and other home study organizations are using the circular. Copies may be obtained thru county agricultural agents or from the College of Agriculture.

Why do hogs root? Will rings or other means of prevention have any detrimental effect on the health and progress of the animals. Experts at the State College of Agriculture say rooting is just one of the natural proclivities of swine. While it probably does help to make muscle it is otherwise of no special benefit and has no particular significance. The fact that hogs show a strong tendency to plow up alfalfa fields or tear out foundations of the buildings is no indication that they are not getting proper feed. There is no basis for the statement that rooting results from lack of mineral or protein in the ration. Hogs root for worms, roots, and other food they seem to thrive just as well when a check is placed on the extensive use of their snouts. They also root to make a cool bed on a hot day. Experts advise the use of rings where hogs do material damage rooting.

An economist at the State College of Agriculture says the high freight rates should stimulate stock feeding in Nebraska. By concentrating corn into meat a material saving can be made in freight charges. For instance it takes around 44 pounds of corn to produce 100 pounds of pork. The freight on 448 pounds of corn from Lincoln to Chicago is \$15.45 while the freight on 100 pounds of pork is 52.5 cents or \$1.02 cents less. It is

argued that should cheap corn and high freight charges remain Nebraska agriculture must undergo some changes, and that in no particular will these changes be more outstanding than in the tendency of farmers to send pork, beef, butter and poultry products to the eastern markets instead of selling grain and hay.

"Our greatest increase of food production in the future must come from increasing our acre yields, but this, in turn, depends upon prices which will justify increased cost. We seem to have been going on the theory that the fertility of our soil, specially in the great corn and tame grass country, is inexhaustible. To the nation this is a most dangerous theory. We must set about in earnest the development of an agricultural policy which will enable us to feed our people at fair prices and at the same time retain the fertility of our soil, our greatest national material asset. In short the people of the nation must come to understand that our prosperity as a nation depends upon a prosperous and wholesome agriculture."—Henry C. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture.

Every person interested in poultry should have a copy of a United States Department of Agriculture farmer's bulletin called "Illustrated Poultry Primer." This is a 32 page book filled with valuable information about many phases of poultry raising on the farm. Practically every step from hatching to marketing is discussed and illustrated, with special emphasis on the selection of breeds, breeding, poultry houses and fixtures, the production of infertile eggs, feeding for egg production, marketing eggs, lice and mites, and common diseases and their treatment. Among the practical illustrations are pictures of a home made candler, a dry mash hopper, the application of lice powder, poultry houses, coops, packing, and grading. There are listed at the end of the bulletin nine essentials of profitable poultry raising. Copies of this bulletin may be obtained thru county agricultural agents or from the College of Agriculture, Lincoln.
