SUPERINTENDENT SNYDER GIVES FIGURES REGARDING MOISTURE CONDITIONS

When a shower of rain falls the wheat crop is made or nearly so if one may judge by the statements made on the street, but it is difficult to borrow at the bank on street talk security. A study of the rainfall for the year 1921 shows a considerable shortage of moisture. However probably the most accurate measure of the relative amount of moisture available at the present time for the crop is a measure of the moisture now stored in the soil. The soil moisture data secured by L. L. Zook and his predecessors at the Experiment Station shows that on or about May 1, of the last nine years, the percentage of moisture to the first six feet of the soil was as follows:

Following wheat	12.1	9.5	2.9	5.4
Following corn	14.6	13.6	8	4.8
Summer tilled	17.3	11.9	1.47	3.38
Prairie sod	14.0	11.9	1.4	5.15

For practical purposes we may consider these percentages as inches of water, and that on May 1, 1921 the soil contained from 3 inch to 2.9 inches less of water than during the average of the last nine years, and from 3.38 to 5.5 inches less water than at the same time in 1920. This indicates the reason for the farmer saying he would like to see "Some real rains that would soak in." While crops are in good condition, and the outlook is all right, yet the farmer would feel more assurance of raising a good crop if the reservoir was full instead of containing less than the average amount of water.

An inch of water safely stored in the soil is worth much more than an inch of rainfall, as the runoff during a heavy shower may amount to 75 per cent.
