The first definite step towards the establishment of the U. S. Grain Growers, Inc., in Nebraska was taken last Friday at Omaha, when approximately twenty-five men, representing shown for a half interest in which the elevators in Nebraska met with Presowners were offered \$51,000.00, but ident C. At the first meeting of the several state delegates at Chicago at which the committee of seventeen plan was adopted, and organization work planned throughout the country President Gustafson was also made director in charge of the U. S. Grain Growers, Inc., in Nebraska. At the Omaha meeting Gustafson outlined plan of the parent organization, also the plan and purpose of the organization in instituting a campaign soon to be undertaken in the state...

It was practically concluded that the first step in the organization work in Nebraska will be the making of contract with the varous co-coperative elevators throughout the state. This work will be done by approximately twenty men prominent in farm organfzation work in the state. These men will soon be called into Lincoln where they will go over the proposition thoroughly and familiarize themselves with the general plan so far as co-op-

It was not decided how soon the signing up of memberships among the growers will not be asked to sign with the U. S. Grain Growers, Inc. until the co-operative elevator in their particular community has first signed, so that the parent organization will be in position to handle the individual growers' grain.

J. N. Norton of the Farm Bureau, W. F. Dale, H. G. Keeney and J. W. Shorthill were selected as an advisory committee for the Nebraska campaign of the U. S. Grain Growers, Inc. These men were delegates from Nebraska to the national meeting at Chicage at which the plan of the U. S. Grain Growers, was adopted.
