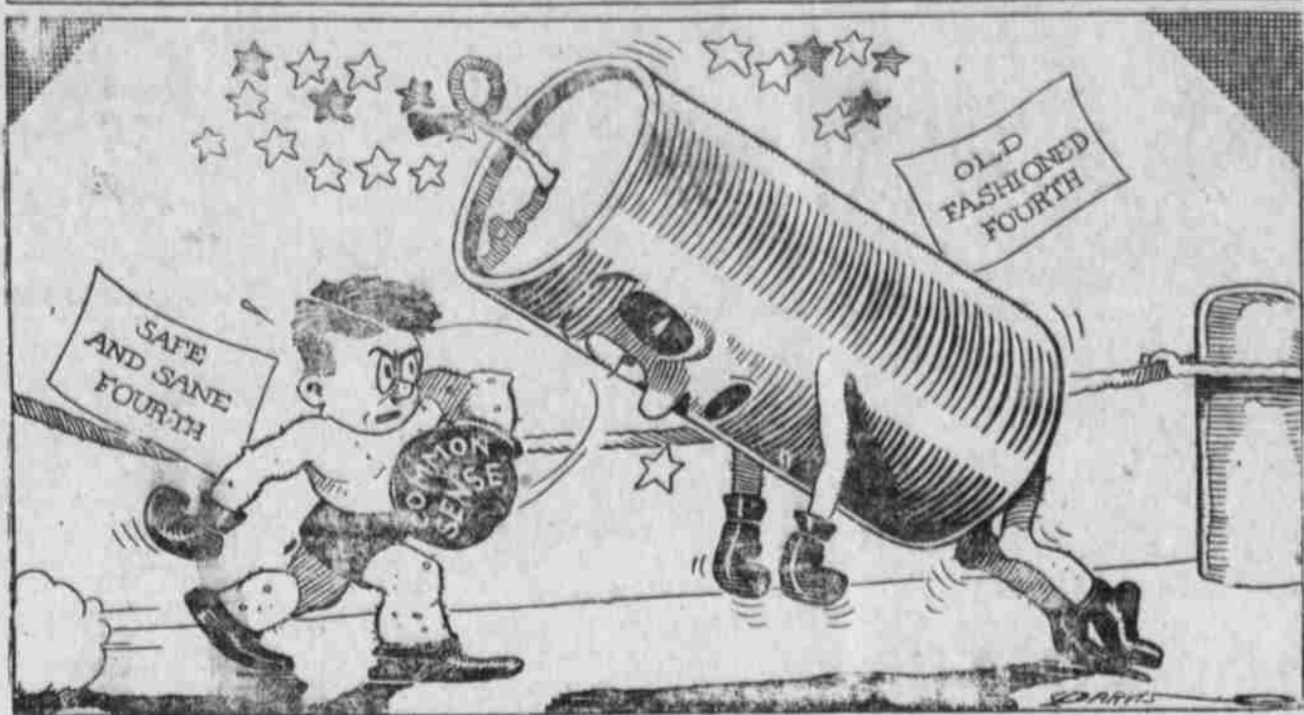

WARNINGS OF BURNING BRUSH ARE ISSUED BY STATE FIRE MARSHAL
