**EDITORIAL.**

Yesterday men were at work at the Fair Grounds putting on the roof to the band stand. This is probably the roofing that was rolled up under the band stand the other day when we were getting wet through while playing "How Dry I Am" in the rain. We hope it will rain the next time we are out there just so we can see if that roof is a delusion.

In another column we are publishing a new ordinance passed by the City Council at its last meeting. This ordinance was rendered necessary by a new state law which required that the City Board of Health be organized differently than it has been organized before. So the new ordinance merely carries out the letter of the new law. The Board of Health of North Platte will be composed of Mayor who is chairman, the Chief of Police who is secretary, the president of the City Council, one physician practicing in North Platte and one other person appointed by the Mayor.

The Fourth of July parade here at North Platte was a big success. We would like to mention and describe the different floats if we had the room and the powers of speech that would do them justice. Some of the lodge, society and business boats were well done and brought much praise from the people who saw them. But we happened to be at the head of the parade in the band and Lester Stamp kept us playing so hard that we did not get to see much but our music. We did pretend a little when the War Mothers were passing us and again when the Carmen were going by. Both of these bodies made us feel that the Fourth of July parade was worth while.

Nothing has been done in Lincoln County about publishing the personal tax schedule and yet we believe it would do more to bring out hidden property and to equalize values, than anything yet proposed. Our greatest civic question today is taxation and anyone having a remedy for the injustice that now prevails, should get it before the people as soon as possible and urge it in the strongest terms he has. Publishing the personal tax schedules is not original with us for it is now done in a number of counties in Nebraska. As we have said before we favor trying it out whether we are included in the publishers or not. The Nebraska

Tax Commissioner is urging it, the American Farm Bureau favors it and other organizations have gone on record urging its general adoption. It is worth considering by all who are face to face with the tax question.

A farmer's wife from over south came into our office the other day and asked if we had received anything from the south side about the Chamber of Commerce. We said we had nothing direct but that the Chamber of Commerce had received a signed statement from a number of farmers thanking it for the ferry and the footbridge. We showed her the list and she said she was glad that the men had sent in that paper as some who had not had opportunity to sign it had been worrying about how they would be able to show their appreciation of the good work the Chamber of Commerce had done. Then she went on to tell how they got necessary groceries, binding twine, mail, medicines, machine repairs, etc., by means of the ferry and the footbridge and how they appreciated it every time they thought of the long trip around by the Hershey bridge. We believe there are a large number of the South Side farmers who now believe that the business men of North Platte mean to render real service to the people of this part of the state and that it only takes such an emergency to give them a chance to carry out their good intentions. It is pretty hard sometimes for the country people and the town people to understand each other but unless they do neither can prosper as it should.
