

SPECIAL ELECTION PROCLAMATION AND NOTICE.

To the Voters of Lincoln County, Nebraska:

By virtue of a resolution duly enacted by the Board of County Commissioners of said County, notice is hereby given that on the 16th day of August, 1921, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A. M. and 8:00 o'clock P. M. at the polling places designated below, a special election will be held of the qualified electors of said County on the proposition to issue and sell negotiable bonds of said County, in the sum of One Hundred Sixty-five Thousand (\$165,000.00) Dollars to bear interest at the rate of six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on coupons attached, and Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars of said bond issue to become due and payable ten (10) years after the date of issue and Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars of said bond issue to become due and payable in each year after said ten (10) year period until all are paid and the purpose for which said bonds are to be issued is to provide funds for paying for the repair, construction or reconstruction work for the following described bridges in said County, including approaches thereto, namely: The Birdwood Precinct Bridge over the North Platte River north of Sutherland, between Section lines 4 and 5, and 8 and 9, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P. M.; the South Platte Bridge over the South Platte River south of Sutherland located on north and south center line in Section 32, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P. M.; the Hershey bridge over the North Platte River north of Hershey, located on Section lines between Sections 8 and 9, Township 14, Range 32, West of the 6th P. M.; the Boatwick bridge over the South Platte River south of Hershey located between Sections 23 and 29, and 32 and 33, Township 14, Range 32 West of the 6th P. M.; the North River bridge over the North Platte River north of North Platte, located in East half (E 1/2) of Section 25, Township 14, Range 30 West of the 6th P. M.; the Osgood bridge over the South Platte River south of North Platte located in West half (W 1/2) of Sections 4 and 9, Township 13, Range 30 West of the 6th P. M.; the Lincoln Highway Bridge over the North Platte River east of North Platte, located on Section lines between Sections 35 and 36, Township 14, Range 30, and Section 1 and 2, Township 13, Range 30, all West of the 6th P. M.; the Maxwell Bridge across the Platte River, located through Sections 28, 32, 33, Township 13, Range 28, and Section 8, Township 12, Range 28, all West of the 6th P. M.; the Brady Bridge across the Platte River, located through Sections 11, 14, 15, 22, 23, 26 and 27, Township 12, Range 27, West of the 6th P. M.; and the question and proposition embraces, also the levy of an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it accrues and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of said bonds at their maturity.

And the question shall be submitted to the qualified electors at said election and upon the official ballots thereat in the following manner and form:

"Shall Lincoln County issue and sell the negotiable coupon bonds of the County, to be styled and known as Internal Improvement bonds of Lincoln County, Nebraska, in denominations of \$1000.00 each and numbered from 1 to 165 inclusive, in the sum of \$165,000.00, to bear interest at six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually, and \$16,500.00 of such bond issue to become due and payable ten (10) years from date of their issue, and \$16,500.00 of such issue to become due and payable each year after said ten (10) year period until all are paid; the said bonds to be issued for the purpose of paying for the repair, construction and reconstruction of the following described bridges in said County, including approaches thereto, namely: the Birdwood Precinct Bridge over the North Platte River north of Sutherland, between Section lines 4 and 5, and 8 and 9, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P. M.; the South Platte Bridge over the South Platte River south of Sutherland, located on north and south center line in Section 32, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P. M.; the Boatwick bridge over the South Platte River south of Hershey, located between Sections 23 and 29, and 32 and 33, Township 14, Range 32 West of the 6th P. M.; the North River bridge over the North Platte River north of North Platte, located in East half (E 1/2) of Section 25, Township 14, Range 30, West of the 6th P. M.; the Osgood bridge over the South Platte River south of North Platte, located in West half (W 1/2) of Sections 4 and 9, Township 13, Range 30 West of the 6th P. M.; the Lincoln Highway bridge over the North Platte River east of North Platte, located on Section lines between Sections 35 and 36, Township 14, Range 30, and Sections 1 and 2, Township 13, Range 30, all West of the 6th P. M.; the Maxwell bridge across the Platte River, located through Sections 28, 32, 33, Township 13, Range 28, and Section 8, Township 12, Range 28, all West of the 6th P. M.; the Brady bridge across the Platte River, located through Sections 11, 14, 15, 22, 23, 26 and 27, Township 12, Range 27, West of the 6th P. M.; and shall an annual tax be levied sufficient to pay the interest on such bonds as it accrues and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of such bonds at their maturity."

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS a certain resolution was duly enacted and passed by the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, State of Nebraska, on the 25th day of June, 1921, declaring that an emergency exists and authorizing the Board of County Commissioners to enter into a contract immediately for the repair and restitution of certain bridges.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that since the above resolution authorized the Board of County Commissioners to enter into a contract immediately for the repair and restitution of certain bridges, we, the Board of County Commissioners hereby authorize and direct the Allied Contractors Inc. of Omaha, Nebraska, to repair the Osgood Bridge south of North Platte, Nebr., through Sections 4 and 9, Township thirteen, range thirty-west of the 6th P. M., and also build a temporary wood bridge at the following location: At Osgood Bridge through Sections 4 and 9, township thirteen, range thirty west of the 6th P. M. Said Allied Contractors Inc. to furnish all machinery, labor and material necessary to repair and build the above described bridges according to the complete satisfaction of the Board of County Commissioners; and that said Board of County Commissioners of the County of Lincoln, State of Nebraska, hereby agree to pay the following itemized prices for said repairs and construction of the above described bridges:

- Wakoleff Sheet Piling for Cofferdams, in place, per M ft. BM \$85.00.
Wakoleff Sheet Piling for permanent use, in place per M ft. BM \$95.00.
Round Piling 8 in. Tops, driven in place, per lineal ft., .95.
Mass Concrete, in place, per cubic foot, .82.
Architectural Concrete in place, per cubic foot, .95.
Dry Excavation, per cubic foot, .05.
Wet Excavation, per cubic foot, .25.
Rock Excavation, per cubic foot, .50.
Placing forms and patterns for architectural concrete per 100 feet BM \$9.00.
Placing forms for Mass Concrete per 100 feet BM \$8.00.
For any re-inforcing steel or other miscellaneous iron per pound in places .09 1/2.
Fir lumber, untreated, in place per M ft. BM, for new work \$65.00; for repair work \$75.00.
For handling Old Lumber, tearing out, per M feet BM, for new work \$8.00 for repair work \$11.00.
For Replacing Old Lumber, per M feet BM for new work \$11.00, for repair work \$13.00.
For any Pile Straps, Drifts or Anchors each, for new work \$1.00, for repair work \$1.25.
For any other Hardware per pound for new work .09, for repair work .10.
For any Overhaul per ton mile, for new work .55, for repair work .65.
For any other work, materials or labor not mentioned above and for the removing of the old concrete spans in the river—Cost plus 15 per cent overhead, plus 10 per cent profit.
And that said prices above mentioned are the fair and reasonable value of said work.

AND WHEREAS said bridges have been condemned for passage, by the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County;

AND WHEREAS it is necessary for said County to repair said bridges immediately, so that that portion of the bridges now standing, can be protected, and all of the bridges be made passable;

AND WHEREAS said repairs are required for the public good, and in the opinion of the County Commissioners an emergency exists;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that since the high flood waters have damaged and destroyed all or a part of all the bridges over the North Platte, the South Platte and Platte Rivers in the County of Lincoln, State of Nebraska, and since it is for the public good that said bridges be repaired and replaced immediately so as not to seriously inconvenience the public.

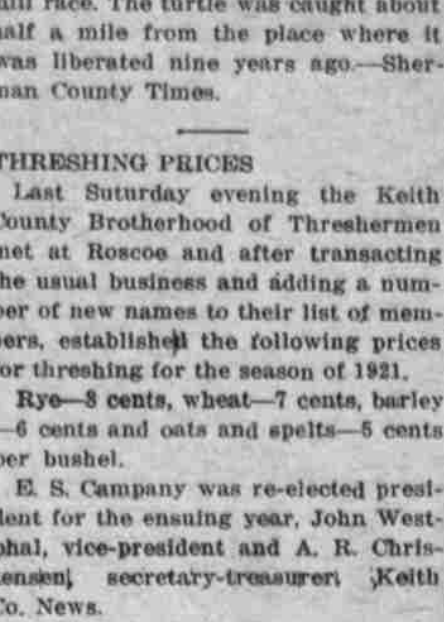
