Concrete feeding floors for hogs are becoming increasingly popular among Nebraska farmers, according to the observations of extension men of the College of Agriculture. A good many farmers believe concrete floors to be worth more than any other piece of hog raising equipment. They save a lot of feed, especially in wet weather, and in addition are sanitary. The hogs are not required to eat mud and filth along with their grain. Time and labor will be saved if the floor is located near the corn crib, and placing it on the south or east side will protect it from the cold winds. Drainage is an important factor; the floor should be sloped in at least one direction & it will drain better after rains or when washed off. A slope of onefourth of an inch to the foot is usually enough. The construction is usually in strips or squares, like concrete walks. The surface should be finished rough to prevent slipperiness. Ful-Urections may be obtained from the College of Agriculture.
