We certainly approve of the rule adopted by the Campfire Council prohibiting the campfire girls from entertaining their boy friends while at camp.

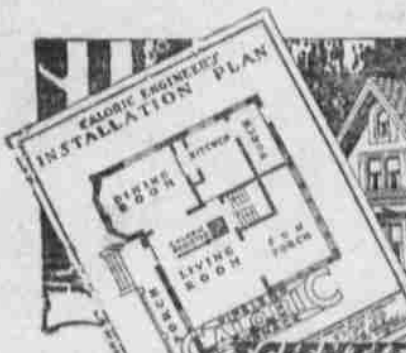

NATURE STUDY IN OUR CITY PARKS.

In Memorial Park and in both City Park and the Cemetery the Nebraska Cottontail (Lepus floridanus similis-Nelson) has been observed on numerous occasions. This little cottontail rabbit is found all through this part of the country. It differs in several minor ways from the Prairie Cottontail of the southeastern part of the state and from the Plains Cottontail of the Northwest. The cottontail is often seen about the city and does some damage in gardens but the numbers are kept down so that the total loss is not great. The cottontail rears several litters of young rabbits each year and they make fine pets. Any child loves to play with a baby rabbit but they can not stand much handling. Cottontails are hunted to some extent in this community but their scarcity does not make them furnish good sport for the hunter. They live on grass, stems, seeds, bark and grains. During very cold weather they eat the bark from fruit trees if it is not protected.

By virtue of a resolution duly enacted by the Board of County Commissioners of said County, notice is hereby given that on the 16th day of August, 1921, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A. M. and 8:00 o'clock P. M. at the polling places designated below, a special election will be held of the qualified electors of said County on the proposition to issue and sell negotiable bonds of said County, in the sum of One Hundred Sixty-five Thousand (\$165,000.00) Dollars to bear interest at the rate of six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on coupons attached, and Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars of said bond issue to become due and payable ten (10) years after the date of issue and Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars of said bond issue to become due and payable in each year after said ten (10) year period until all are paid and the purpose for which said bonds are to be issued is to provide funds for paying for the repair, construction or reconstruction work for the following described bridges in said County, including approaches thereto, namely: The Birdwood Precinct Bridge over the North Platte River north of Sutherland, between Section lines 4 and 5, and 8 and 9, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P. M.; the South Platte Bridge over the South Platte River south of Sutherland located on north and south center line in Section 32, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P. M.; the Hershey bridge over the North Platte River north of Hershey, located on Section lines between Sections 8 and 9, Township 14 Range 32, West of the 6th P. M.; the Bostwick Bridge over the South Platte River south of Hershey located between Sections 28 and 29, and 32 and 33, Township 14, Range 32 West of the 6th P. M.; the North River bridge over the North Platte River north of North Platte, located in East half (E 1/2) of Section 28, Township 14, Range 30 West of the 6th P. M.; the Osgood bridge over the North Platte River south of North Platte, located in West half (W 1/2) of Sections 4 and 9, Township 13, Range 30 West of the 6th P. M.; the Lincoln Highway bridge over the North Platte River east of North Platte, located on Section lines between Sections 35 and 36, Township 14, Range 30, and Sections 1 and 2, Township 13, Range 30, all West of the 6th P. M.; the Maxwell bridge across the Platte River, located through Sections 28, 32, 33, Township 13, Range 28, and Section 9, Township 12, Range 28, all West of the 6th P. M.; the Brady bridge across the Platte River, located through Sections 11, 14, 15, 22, 23, 25 and 27, Township 12, Range 27, West of the 6th P. M.; and the question and proposition embraces, also the levy of an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it accrues and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of said bonds at their maturity.

And the question shall be submitted to the qualified electors at said election and appear upon the official ballots thereat in the following manner and form:

"Shall Lincoln County issue and sell the negotiable coupon bonds of the County, to be styled and known as Internal Improvement bonds of Lincoln County, Nebraska, in denominations of \$1000.00 each and numbered from 1 to 165 inclusive, in the sum of \$165,000.00, to bear interest at six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually, and \$16,500.00 of such bond issue to become due and payable ten (10) years from date of their issue, and \$16,500.00 of such issue to become due and payable each year after said ten (10) year period until all are paid; the said bonds to be issued for the purpose of paying for the repair, construction and reconstruction of the following described bridges in said County, including approaches thereto, namely: The Birdwood Precinct Bridge over the North Platte River north of Sutherland, between Section lines 4 and 5, and 8 and 9, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P. M.; the South Platte Bridge over the South Platte River south of Sutherland, located on north and south center line in Section 32, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P. M.; the Hershey bridge over the North Platte River north of Hershey, located on Section lines between Sections 3 and 9, Township 14, Range 32 West of the 6th P. M.; the Bostwick bridge over the South Platte River south of Hershey, located between Sections 28 and 29, and 32 and 33, Township 14, Range 32 West of the 6th P. M.; the North River bridge over the North Platte River north of North Platte, located in East half (E 1/2) of Section 28, Township 14, Range 30, West of the 6th P. M.; the Osgood bridge over the South Platte River south of North Platte, located in West half (W 1/2) of Sections 4 and 9, Township 13, Range 30 West of the 6th P. M.; the Lincoln Highway bridge over the North Platte River east of North Platte, located on Section lines between Sections 35 and 36, Township 14, Range 30, and Sections 1 and 2, Township 13, Range 30, all West of the 6th P. M.; the Maxwell bridge across the Platte River, located through Sections 28, 32, 33, Township 13, Range 28, and Section 9, Township 12, Range 28, all West of the 6th P. M.; the Brady bridge across the Platte River, located through Sections 11, 14, 15, 22, 23, 25 and 27, Township 12, Range 27, West of the 6th P. M.; and shall an annual tax be levied sufficient to pay the interest on such bonds as it accrues and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of such bonds at their maturity."
