COUNTY AGENT KELLOGG MAKES REPORT OF ACTIVITIES FOR JUNE.

Following is a copy of the report made by County Agent Kellogg regarding his work in Farm Bureau and Agricultural Extension work:
There were 19 days spent in the field and 7 days in the office; traveled 1136 miles by auto; wrote 85 letters (personal), and 55 circular letters had 144 phone calls and 325 office callers. A total of 16 meetings were held with an attendance of 275 people. Poultry slides were shown at three meetings, six poultry culling demonstrations were held, with an attendance of 111. 46 farm visits were made. 150 bulletins on live stock disease and farm crop problems were distributed. The Farm Bureau distributed 70 doses of blackleg vaccine, 1 quart of poisoned oats for prairie dogs and rats, 154 pounds of arsenate of lead for potato bugs, and 6 pounds of white arsenic for grasshoppers work. Farm Bureau organizations were completed in five Precincts all of which adopted their program of work for the year. Considerable miscellaneous work is done each month, of which the Junior Club is a part. Personal visits were made to each of the 24 club members and their records inspected.
