EDITORIAL

We are getting tired of watering our lawn all of the time, day and night. It seems that the weather is following pretty closely along the lines laid down for it by Weatherman Shilling. Why don't he predict a rain and see if we wouldn't get one. We really need rain. Anyone who will impress this on Pa Shilling will confer a favor on the whole community.

The Tribune heartily commends the suggestion that North Platte day be celebrated at the Platte River Round-Up. We should get a large delegation from here and attend in a body. In order that the people at the Round-Up may know who we are and why we are there we would suggest that some badge or ornament be worn which would enable everyone attending from here to be known at sight. The fact that the Round-Up is being held on the old John Bratt ranch links it up with North Platte and her people. The fact that it is attracting wide interest over the Missouri valley should recommend it to our people.

The room at 604 Dewey, formerly occupied by the Walker Music Co. is being put in shape for a new store. It is to be a clothing store, owned and managed by Edward W. Reynolds, formerly of the Edwards-Reynolds Co. Mr. Reynolds says he has bought a stock of ready-made suits and overcoats and that he will be open for business about August 10. He will not carry any kind of men's furnishings but will confine his entire attention to suits and coats. He expects to take orders for the finer grades of tailor made goods. In addition to the ready-made lines which he will carry in stock. This is a new venture in a city of this size and may be a big success from the start. All the big cities have specialists in clothing for men and Mr. Reynolds believes that North Platte can support such a store and he is going to put his belief into practice.

We have no information recently about the progress on the Sales Pavilion. It seems that some stockmen subscribed for stock on the condition that no North Platte business or professional men be allowed to take stock. When this was announced it was disappointing to some North Platte men who had wanted to show their interest in the enterprise. However it was somewhat encouraging as it seemed to show the determination of the farmers and stockmen to carry the building through to a successful finish. Then came the announcement that the stand taken by these farmers was disavowed by such groups as the Lincoln County Hereford Breeders' Association and that the subscriptions should be open to anyone who wanted to see the building put up. And there it stands as far as we have have any knowledge. We would like to hear what the officers are working away on the project and that it will be a reality by the time it is needed.

The mature women of North Platte should come to the front and offer their services to the Campfire Council as guardians of camp fire groups. Young ladies and older girls have done fine and are needed but the backbone of camp fire is bound to be with the mothers. Not all mothers will make good guardians but some of them will and it should be left to the judgment of the Council to decide. We understand there are now some campfire groups without guardians and some that should be organized but cannot be formed until guardians have been secured. Teachers make good assistants but unless they live here they can only have varied success as leaders because of the break that comes every summer just when the largest activities of the group will come. For the largest measure of continued leadership in campfire work it takes the services of successful mothers as leaders. Until these can be secured the results will not always be satisfactory.

If a vote of all parents could be taken, most of them would say that the average boy from 12 to 18 is lazy. Most boys are accustomed to hear either father or mother or both tell them they are lazy. Some boys get used to it and get to thinking they really are lazy. But it is not strictly true. Some boys may be lazy but they are few. What really is the matter with boys is that they are just being real boys—they don't know what they are doing part of the time, they don't know why they do it and they don't know what they will do next. The following clipping from the Beatrice Sun tells of the results in Gage County from the publishing of the personal tax schedules: "The order of the county board of supervisors of Gage county, Nebraska, that the tax assessment list shall be published is producing results. The publicity given roused indignation among citizens who find that wealthy men in both city and country have been giving in the value of their possessions at much less than is found in the home of many humble wage earners. Numerous cases have already been cited, the agitation of which has com-

pelled many would-be slackers to make good. It was shown that two stocks of merchandise, one listed at \$5,000 and the other at \$23,000, were found to be of apparently the same quantity and kind of goods. Another case showed that one person gave in the figure of \$850, and it developed that he had nearly \$28,000 of taxable property. County officials assert that the publicity plan is bringing such results as will mean many more shekels to the county treasurer than would have been the case if the slackers were not being showed up."

To the Voters of Lincoln County, Nebraska:

By virtue of a resolution duly enacted by the Board of County Commissioners of said County, notice is hereby given that on the 16th day of August, 1921, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A. M. and 8:00 o'clock P. M. at the polling places designated below, a special election will be held of the qualified electors of said County on the proposition to issue and sell negotiable bonds of said County, in the sum of One Hundred Sixty-five Thousand (\$165,000.00) Dollars to bear interest at the rate of six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on coupons attached, and Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars of said bond issue to become due and payable ten (10) years after the date of issue and Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars of said bond issue to become due and payable in each year after said ten (10) year period until all are paid and the purpose for which said bonds are to be issued is to provide funds for paying for the repair, construction or reconstruction work for the following described bridges in said County, including approaches thereto, namely: The Birdwood Precinct Bridge over the North Platte River north of Sutherland, between Section lines 4 and 5, and 8 and 9, Township 14, Range 33 West of the 6th P.
