SCHOOL WILL OPEN SOON

BOARD OF EDUCATION SETS DATE FOR OPENING OF NEW SCHOOL YEAR.

The North Platte city schools will open Monday Sept. 5th, according to announcements made yesterday from the office of Superintendent C. L. Littel. This opening will be for the purpose of organization and assigning of lessons but no work will be done. Arrangements will be made so that the opening will not interfere with the celebration of Labor Day.

Registration in the Senior and Junior High Schools will take place on Thursday Sept. 1 and on Friday Sept. 2nd. Following is the complete schedule of registration for each school:

All 12th graders whose names begin from A to L will register in the Central Building September 1 from 9 to 12.

All 12th graders whose names begin from M to Z will register September 1 from 1 to 4.

All 11th graders whose names begin from A to L will register September 2 from 8 to 10.

All 11th graders whose names begin from M to Z will register September 2 from 10 to 12.

All 10th graders whose names begin from A to L will register September 2 from 1 to 3.

All 10th graders whose names begin from M to Z will register September 2 from 3 to 5.

All 9th graders whose names begin from A to L will register September 1 from 8 to 10.

All 9th graders whose names begin from M to Z will register September 1 from 10 to 12.

All 8th graders whose names begin from A to L will register September 1 from 1 to 4.

All 8th graders whose names begin from M to Z will register September 2 from 8 to 11.

All 7th graders whose names begin from A to L will register September 2 from 12:30 to 3.

All 7th graders whose names begin from M to Z will register September 2 from 3 to 5.

In the grade schools, the program is not so exact. It is not expected that pupils will appear at the school houses before Monday Sept. 5. Then they will be assigned to the room and grade to which they belong. It is planned to maintain a kindergarten in each building. These will be free to all children who are five years old or over and will maintain half-day sessions only. A new departure in the school work here is the institution of opportunity rooms in two of the ward

schools. Here those pupils who have been retarded because of lack of opportunity through sickness or otherwise, can be given individual attention and pushed up to the grade where he or she belongs.

SHERIFFS HOLD STATE CONVENTION AND STAGE HOLD-UP OF STORE.

The state convention of the Nebraska Sheriffs' Association was held in North Platte yesterday. The men were met at the depot and taken to the Court House where the business session was held. After dinner they were taken for a ride. As they were being driven about the city some heavily armed and masked men held up the Clinton Jewelry Store and started to escape with the booty in a high-powered car. The sheriffs joined in the chase and captured the bandits near the Cody ranch. When unmasked they proved to be friends on a lark. Nearly the entertainment of the afternoon was provided by Clarence Moore and Al Hastings of the Platte Valley Lark Co. They had gathered 13 wild horses, 2 mules, 6 steers and five or six riders. The cowboy stunts with other entertainment occupied the afternoon. A fine picnic dinner was served in the grove following which the sheriffs came to the city and later left for their homes. A. J. Sallsbury was the President of the Association and the guiding hand in the day's festivities.

LIGHTNING STRIKES TREE WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS AND TAKES A LIFE

A big tree in the J. C. Strahorn yard at 109 W. Second was struck by lightning during the storm last Tuesday evening. It was shattered along the bank and split somewhat but is still standing. A blue jay which happened to be in the tree at the time was found dead under the tree after the storm. In the neighboring houses the effects of the lightning were felt by the residents but aside from some minor damage to the plumbing in the Strahorn home there was no other effects.
