BRIDGE BONDS

KING RHILEY

This week King Rhiley is putting the finishing touches on his big powerful racing car preparatory to making organization of the state of Colorado. The race is held under direction of the Denver Post and the big racing organization of the state of Colorado and is for professionals only. Another thing that one must do to enter the contest is to belong to the American Automobile Association. King has qualified all the way through and in entering the race is going up against some of the hardest competition that a man gets a chance at in such contests. The winner of the race last year will be there and he is getting a big car ready that is furnished by the Lexington Motor company and the company has a corps of experts on the grounds getting every detail in condition to win again if it is possible. They have had the benefit of experience in this same contest held in other years and know the road from start to finish. King expects to be there a few days ahead and will go over the route a couple of times before the start and we venture to say that he will know about every bump and rough spot on the route when the gong sounds for the start.

This means a turn in Rhiley's career as a racer, or rather it is the advancement in his racing. He has been far too fast for any of his competitors right along since he won his first race in 1912 over the holder of the record on dirt tracks at the Alliance races. He has put North Platte on the map as a racing city and his name and records are known throughout the state as the speediest racer in the middle west. The following taken from a letter written by the secretary of the North Platte Chamber of Commerce tells the story in a few words:

"The Board of Directors of this organization directs me to thank you for the interest that you have taken in the North Platte races during the past three years, and to commend you for your clean, manly work on the track. In your racing on the North Platte track you have been above suspicion as to irregularities of any nature, and it is with pleasure that the North Platte Chamber of Commerce gives you the highest possible endorsement. It was King Rhiley who made auto racing popular in North Platte, and you are entitled to no small meed of praise. The best wishes of this organization goes with you in all your future endeavors."

The above letter was written at the time the Chamber of Commerce sent the \$700.00 loving cup properly engraved to Rhiley. This cup, having

been won in three sweepstakes is now the property of Rhiley and is highly prized by him, but not more so than the high tribute paid him in the letter.

In addition to the big hill climbing contest the 5th of the coming month, Rhiley also plans on entering the Ak-Sar-Ben Field dirt track races the latter part of September and he is also in receipt of a handsome offer to appear on the tracks at Rapid City, S. D., the fore part of the coming month. From now on Rhiley will be in the big leagues as far as a racer is concerned and will give just as good an account of himself there as he has in the semi-professional races. He may lose, of course, and it is to be expected that he will lose occasionally, but he will be just as game a loser as he will be as a winner. And another thing we can be assured of and that is if he does lose the other fellow will have to go some.—Oshkosh News.

Sept. 6th, 1921 for furnishing labor and material for the construction of the proposed Water Main Extension for said city in accordance with the plans and specifications on file with the City Clerk. Said engineer's estimate of the cost of constructing said Water Main complete in place is as follows:

56,440 ft. six inch Class B cast iron pipe including 32 6x6 crosses;
One 6x6x8 cross, 83 4x6x6 T's all class B cast iron \$1.45 per ft.

53 six (6) inch hub end, bronze mounted double gate valves suitable for 125 lb. water pressure, with cast iron adjustable valve boxes complete in place at \$33.00 each.

83 hydrants bronze mounted, with four inch inlet and two (2) two and one-half (2 1/2) inch nozzles and of sufficient length to connect with pipe four and one-half (4 1/2) feet below the surface with 12 feet of 4 inch cast iron pipe with each complete in place \$65.00 each.
