ORDINANCE NO. 130.
AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL ARTICLES NUMBER IX, OF CHAPTER ELEVEN, PAGE 94, OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NORTH PLATTE, NEBRASKA IN FORCE JANUARY 1911, RELATING TO PROMOTION OF AND PARTICIPATION IN BOXING AND WRESTLING MATCHES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH PLATTE, NEBRASKA: Section 1. That Article IX of Chapter Eleven of the Revised Ordinances of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, in force January 1911 relating to promotion of and participation in boxing and wrestling matches be and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval according to law.
