

**LINCOLN HIGHWAY WAS PICKED OUT TO SERVE CONVENIENCE OF GARAGES.**

Frank A. Harrison, who is making a tour of Nebraska and reporting about the highways, tourist camp grounds and tourist conveniences, writes as follows after he left North Platte: From Big Springs to North Platte the Lincoln highway is a beautiful gravel road, not excelled anywhere. From North Platte to Cozad, great difficulties had to be met principally because this part of the highway was picked out to serve the conveniences of certain garages instead of making it easy for the traveling public.

Nearly forty miles of the road from Gothenburg west could have been sent across the river where it would have passed thru the wide and fertile valley of the Platte, with fine farm improvements and wondrous crops. It would have gone past the military cemetery and the sight of old Fort McPherson and would have turned back across the river at the state experimental farm.

There are evidences that the directors of this highway listened to garage men very closely. They sent the road thru the long strip of sand on the north side, following the railroad on the right of way and thru sand so deep that now after years of work and experience it is a reproach to the name of the highway, and being on the railroad ground it cannot get federal aid. It passes thru a territory that gives the tourist the idea that Lincoln county is a streak of sand.

It is worthy of note that the Lincoln Highway association is a paper concern made up almost entirely of officers and pays out not a cent on the improvement of the road confining its expense to the marking of poles so as to lead travelers in front of favored garages.

Lincoln county can well afford to retire these garage men and "consults" of the highway on liberal pensions, and take entire charge of the marking of roads as well as the maintenance of them.—State Journal.

**EDITOR OF SCOUT BULLETIN TELLS ABOUT OFFICIAL SCOUT UNIFORM.**

The question "Does a boy have to have a uniform before he can be a scout?" comes to us so often that it seems best to give some space to the explanation of the matter.

We want the boys to have uniforms where it is possible for them to get one, but some of the best scouts in town are the boys without. A plan is on foot to give every boy a chance to earn a uniform. There has been considerable trouble over the boys who are not scouts buying scout equipment and passing themselves off as members of the organization. That has made many folks feel that scouting is not worth a dime. To prevent this as much as possible the council has decided to have some local dealer handle the official equipment and a list of all scouts who are officially enrolled has been handed to him so he may know who the scouts are.

The intention of the above paragraph was not to infer that every boy out of scouting is not on the square but there have been cases come to our attention where a boy has done scouting a good deal of harm through such misinterpretation.

**RED CROSS SENDS "CLEAN-UP SQUAD" HERE TO AID SERVICE MEN.**

An opportunity will be given every veteran of the World War in Lincoln, Frontier, Hayes, Hitchcock, Dundy, Chase, Perkins, Logan, Deuel, Keith, Arthur and McPherson Counties to receive assistance in the settling of claims for compensation, advice as to hospitalization or vocational education or information relative to any problem arising from his war service on Sept. 10 when the local "Clean-Up Campaign" is on. The American Red Cross and the American Legion are participating in this work at the request of the government and a united effort is being made to help every ex-service man who needs assistance of any kind. The Clean-Up squad will make its headquarters at North Platte. Its members include a medical examiner and a representative of the Federal Board for Vocational Education, a compensation and insurance claims examiner and a representative of the American Red Cross and the American Legion.

An especial effort is being made to get in touch with every man in the county who is in any way entitled to assistance. Where it is not possible because of illness or disability to present claims in person, the local Red Cross workers will endeavor to assist in getting necessary information to members of the squad.

As this is the most intensive effort which has yet been made to locate all claimants and adjust their claims satisfactorily the cooperation of every resident is asked in reaching these cases.

Last year the American Red Cross spent approximately \$10,000,000 in serving disabled ex-service men and their families. This one department of Red Cross activity cost nearly \$4,000,000 more than the total receipts from last year's membership dues.

Of the men discharged from the Army and Navy and yet entitled to governmental medical treatment and aid, there are at present 26,300 men in government and contract hospitals throughout the country. This is eight times the number cared for in 1919 and the number of these cases needing treatment will undoubtedly continue to increase rapidly for several years. According to a statement from the Surgeon General's office of the Army, the peak of disability will probably not be reached before 1925 if it is then.

**TRI-COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION AND PICNIC COMES NEXT SUNDAY.**

The officers have issued the following statement: On the county line between Lincoln and Logan counties and near the county line of McPherson county, on section 4, township 15, range 29, the tri-county Sunday school convention will be held on September 4th.

This is a convention of all the Sunday schools in the three counties named. The program will be given by 500 children. There will be in attendance, it is believed, not less than 2,000 people. Each Sunday school is asked that two or three classes be there to take part in the program by singing, readings, dialogues or by rendering anything they have prepared. This will be one of the biggest picnics ever held in this part of the state.

There will be fried chicken and watermelon for everybody at dinner, and in order to be sure that all can be accommodated everyone is asked to put in a few melons extra for their friends.

This picnic is an annual affair and this is the third one held in a grove at the place mentioned.

A nice banner is to be given to the delegation which has traveled the greatest number of miles in attending the convention.

**UNION PACIFIC OFFERS SCHOLARSHIP FOR BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB WORK.**

In a communication from President C. R. Gray of the Union Pacific Railroad Co. received by County Agent Geo. H. Kellogg this week we have the following offer of a scholarship:

The Union Pacific Railroad Co. offers to the boy between sixteen and twenty-one years of age ranking the highest in the Boys and Girls Club work for the year 1922, in Corn, Potato, or Wheat project a Seventy-five dollar Scholarship in the College of Agriculture, the School of Agriculture, or the Short Winter Course of the School of Agriculture in the University of Nebraska.

In addition the Union Pacific Railroad Company will reimburse the student for the expense of railroad transportation from his home to Lincoln, Nebraska, and return, over its lines.

The County winner will be determined on the following basis:

(a) Seventy-five per cent on rank in club work.

(b) Twenty-five per cent on activities of the boy in community affairs.

The winner shall be chosen from among the ten boys ranking highest in the County Club projects, as outlined by the College of Agriculture.

The rank of these boys in the Community Affairs and the County winner, will be determined by a committee of three, consisting of the County Superintendent, one person appointed by the Director of Extension in the University of Nebraska, and the third person to be chosen by these two members.

The scholarship shall be used within a year of the date of award, except where a boy is a regular attendant at school. In this case, it may be used the year following, or at the next session following the time the boy finishes his school.

It is proposed that five acres of corn, ten acres of wheat, or one acre of potatoes, shall be grown by each person entering the above competition.

The same prizes are offered by the Union Pacific Railroad Company for 1921 as those outlined above for the year 1922; except that the competition shall be upon projects now in effect such as Calf Clubs, Pig Clubs, Potato and Corn Clubs, etc., and are offered only in such Counties as can be arranged between this date and the close of the present season.

The prizes for the current year will be effective as soon as the projects are completed and the awards made.

**SCOUT EXECUTIVE TELLS OF SCOUTS PART IN THE CLEAN-UP.**

The Second Annual Clean Up Campaign was a success from every standpoint. Last year it was put over by a few of the boys as our organization was not in as good shape as it is now. This year about 50 boys had a chance to help and there is some very good training in doing that type of work. The boys who went out this year had a much better idea of how to judge the places than they had last year. There were some cases where it looked to the party living in the place as though the boys were showing partiality. Such was not the case, however, and there were very few complaints when you stop to realize that they cleaned about 1200 houses. As far as we know there have been only five or six and some of them were not very clean.

There were 660, 100 per cent cards put out varying in number on different streets—seventy per cent of the houses in East Second received cards, 80 per cent on East Second, 43 per cent on East Third, 66 per cent on West Third, 52 per cent on East Fourth, 67 per cent on West Fourth, 33 per cent on East Fifth, 67 per cent on West Fifth, 35 per cent on East Sixth, 64 per cent on West Sixth, 40 per cent on West Front, 8 per cent on East Seventh, 50 per cent on West Seventh, 55 per cent on East Eighth, 64 per cent on West Eighth, 33 per cent on East Ninth, 74 per cent on West Ninth, 42 per cent on East Tenth, 70 per cent on West Tenth, 57 per cent on East Eleventh, 72 per cent on West Eleventh, 50 per cent on East Twelfth, 49 per cent on West Twelfth, 60 per cent on South Vine, 66 per cent on South Locust, 33 per cent on North Locust, 71 per cent on South Ash, 57 per cent on South Maple, 57 per cent on South Pine, 82 per cent on South Sycamore, 60 per cent on South Chestnut, 43 per cent on South Dewey, 50 per cent on North Dewey.

That makes south Sycamore high with 82 per cent and west Second next with 80 per cent.

The boys undoubtedly missed some houses but the cards are all gone and no more will be printed this year. There are so few houses left that it would not pay to have any more cards printed as a different color will be used next year.
