FARM BUREAU NEWS SERVICE SUPPLIES ITEMS FOR THE TRIBUNE READERS

The Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation has been advised by certain Idaho fruit associations that apples can be secured at Idaho points in car lots for sale to groups of farmers throughout Nebraska, and persons interested are advised to write the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation at Lincoln for details.

According to Saunders County Farm Bureau officials, Saunders County Kanred wheat has been much sought after this year for seedling purposes. Practically the entire crop of the county has already been disposed of, according to agricultural extension agent Walter Roberts. Many car loads were shipped to Iowa points while Nebraska buyers also took a good share of the crop. Farmers who had certified wheat received thirty cents above market quotations, the greater portion being sold for \$1.33 per bushel.

The Nebraska Agricultural Council, composed of the heads of the various farm organizations in Nebraska, will hold a meeting at Omaha on October 12, to form some definite plan as to what part Nebraska agriculturists take in encouraging the development of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence waterway. It is also hoped that any agriculturists who are interested in this great freight saving proposition will attend the meeting. An effort will be made to have a member of the joint commission now considering the proposition at this meeting, or at least some one who is conversant with the work of the commission. An almost similar meeting has also been called to meet in the rooms of the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce on September 28. A call for the latter meeting has been sent out by Governor McKelvie addressed to commercial clubs and farm organizations.

Farmers are over-marketing their wheat according to Secretary Herbert Hoover, at Washington, expressed in a telegram to the American Farm Bureau Federation and first made public by W. G. Jamison of the Farm Bureau Federation on his visit to Lincoln last week. Secretary Hoover admitted the fact that many farmers have been forced by their creditors to sell when so advised by Mr. Jamison, but he promised to use his best efforts to prevail upon the federal reserve bank board to again open the federal reserve system to handling discounts of farmers' paper with grain and live stock as security, through the country banks. Hoover contends that farmers are now taking a loss of at least twenty-five cents per bushel on their wheat by reason of congestion in eastern terminals and

over-marketing. He says that 130,000,000 bushels of wheat was marketed during the first thirty days of the new crop compared with 68,000,000 one year ago, and that at least forty per cent of the crop has now passed out of the farmers' hands. It is the belief of Secretary Hoover that the revived war finance corporation will be able henceforth to extend sufficient credit to farmers that the unprecedented rush of marketing may be restrained.

WYOMING COUNTY HAS TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND ACRES OF PRAIRIE DOGS

Prairie dogs infest 200,000 acres of farm land in Niobrara County, Wyo. This is a yearly loss to the county of at least \$50,000 while another \$50,000, it is estimated, is lost through pocket gophers and ground squirrels. A vigorous movement to rid the county of these unnecessary pests has been instituted under the guidance of the county agent and the State specialist of the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture and the state agricultural college.

The poisoning work is to be confined more or less to those prairie-dog "towns" in which all landowners will give their united support to help bring about a complete cleanup. A dog "town" of 160 acres about 9 miles west of Manville was the first to be cleaned up, then a large town west of Lusk. The latter was gone over once and 99 per cent of the prairie dogs were killed, but it is to be gone over again. A town of 25,000 acres east of Lance Creek is to be tackled next. It will probably take all summer to get it entirely cleaned up. An expert from the Bureau of Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture is detailed to work with the landowners in this section for two weeks, and another will take the work up again in mid-summer and stay with the job until it is completed.

Free bait is being furnished for the Government land, and county commissioners are helping finance the small sections where it proves necessary. One by one the prairie dog towns of the county will be covered in this way.

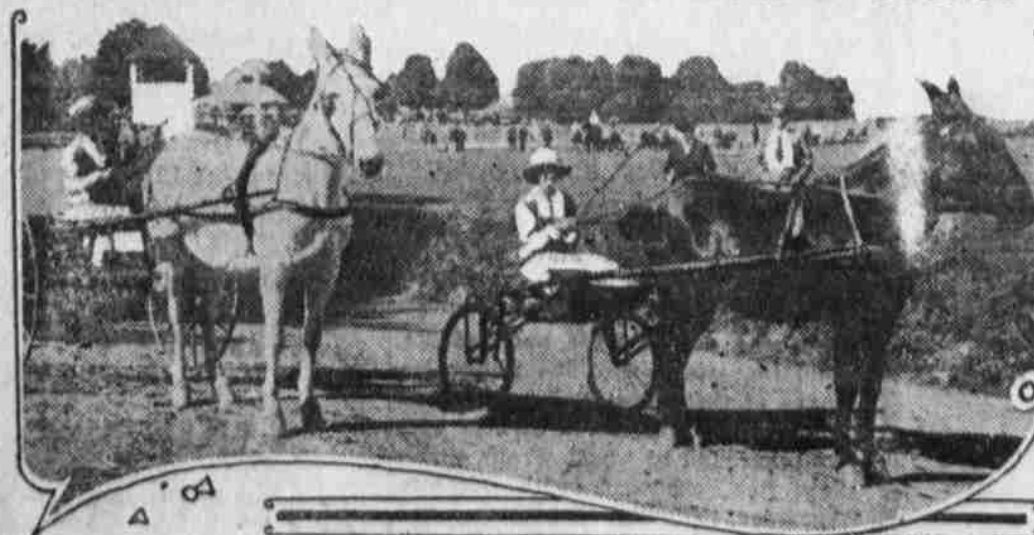
