FOOTBALL KICK OFF TODAY

HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM TO PLAY COZAD ON LOCAL FIELD TODAY

North Platte will open the local football season at 3:30 o'clock Friday at the Fair Grounds Park, with Cozad as its opponent as the visiting team.

North Platte should have a strong team this year, most of the positions being filled by veterans of last year's team. Cozad claims to have a much stronger team than last year and hopes to give the local eleven a real tussle.

A number of last year's men have been shifted from the positions previously played. Yost showing exceptionally well at right tackle, with Shaner, who played at end last year is piloting the team and gives promise of being one of the heaviest quarter backs North Platte has had for many years. Butch Simon has been shifted from tackle to the back field and is showing exceptionally well at full back. Dent, who was a substitute on last year's team, is playing right half back position. The balance of last year's veterans are in the same positions as heretofore.

The game will be called promptly at 3:30. Cars may be parked on the north side of the field, a parking charge of 50c per car being made. Spectators who are not in cars, are requested to use grand stand, as a much better view of the game can be had from that point of vantage.

General admission will be 50c, with no extra charge for the grand stand.

Only the players, coaches and the letter men of past teams will be permitted seats on the side lines.

It is hoped that a good crowd will turn out to appraise the ability of the local eleven in its first contest.

The principal entertainment consisted of a big feed and several boxing bouts. The steer for the barbecue was donated by the Telegraph and the trimmings came from other sources.

Superintendent Aileen G. Cochran in her rounds of inspecting the rural schools of Lincoln County has discovered several families where the children are unable to attend school because they lack the proper clothing. She is anxious to supply this need so that the children can be put in school as soon as possible and to that end she is asking anyone who will donate children's clothing in good condition to phone 502 W.

The Women's Benefit Association of North Platte has endorsed Miss M. West for appointment by President Harding as a member of the Advisory Committee on the Limitation of Armaments. Miss West is Supreme Commander of the W. B. A. and has the confidence of the entire membership. North Platte Women's Benefit Association of the Maccabees has over 220 members and its influence will be felt in pushing this appointment.

The post office employees have been telling for some time that they do not have enough space in the work room to enable them to do their work as it should be done and the Chamber of Commerce has become interested in getting the work room enlarged.

One item of expense to Lincoln County to which the average person gives little thought is the care of the poor, the sick and the unfortunate. The expense of caring for these people is about eight thousand dollars a year on an average for the past eight years. The most of this expense comes from the care of the sick and infirm at the County Hospital in which these are at present eight patients at an expense of \$115 a week. When we complain about high taxes, it would be well to remember this item and be glad that we can do something for these unfortunates.

HIGH SCHOOL CADET BAND TO PLAY TWO DAY ENGAGEMENT AT LEWELLEN.

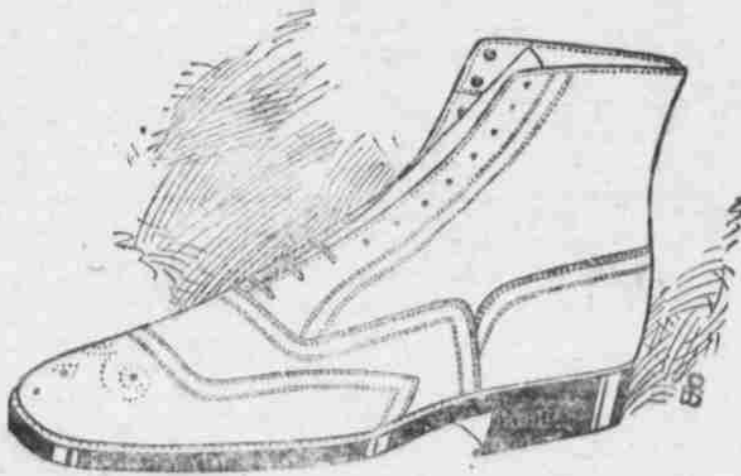
