Lincoln county is two and a half times as large as Keith but the exhibits did not average more.

Lincoln had less horses, about the same number of cattle, forty head more of hogs, a slightly larger exhibit of farm products, twenty more

coops of poultry, a smaller exhibit of kitchen and dairy products and no educational exhibit whatever.

The program of entertainment was different from that in Keith in some respects but did not meet with any great favor.

The charge for admission to the ground and grandstand accommodations were higher in North Platte than in Ogallala and the association reports the attendance below normal.—Keith County News.

COMMANDMENTS

The following ten commandments have been adopted by the Ranchmen Farmers and Landowners in North Lincoln county and all of McPherson and Arthur counties.

1. Thou shalt not trespass on our land for we are the owners.

2. Thou shalt not take your gun and dog and hunt on our land.

3. Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy. Six days shalt thou work and on the seventh have a good time but do not trespass on your neighbor's land.

4. Honor the laws of your country and you will not get in trouble.

5. Thou shalt not kill chickens or ducks other than on your own land.

6. Thou shalt not commit the crime of disobeying these commandments.

7. Thou shalt not steal the game which we have raised, fed and protected.

8. Thou shalt not bear arms or ammunition on your neighbor's premises.

9. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's chickens or his ducks, either on land or on the water. Neither shalt thou question our right to give these commandments.

10. Thou shalt respect thy neighbor as thyself and be a good scout. Those who ignore or break these commandments shall be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. So speak all the ranchmen, farmers and land owners of the territory lying to the north of the North Platte River and in the Provinces known as McPherson and Arthur counties.—Sutherland Courier.
