THE FIRST TOUCHDOWN MADE IN TWENTY SECONDS OF PLAY AT MCCOOK FRIDAY.

The football game at McCook, Friday between the local eleven and the McCook team, was started exactly at three o'clock. McCook kicked off, the ball was received by Shaner and passed to Locke who made the first touchdown exactly at twenty seconds passed three o'clock. McCook again kicked off and on a fake to the left North Platte scored their second touchdown. Then for forty six minutes neither opponent made a score. During this time one of the hardest battles ever waged on a football gridiron took place. McCook spoiled every play North Platte attempted with North Platte returning the compliment. At the end of the third quarter North Platte had the ball on the end of the yard line with four downs to go. Immediately after the opening of the fourth quarter North Platte made a touchdown. On the last touchdown North Platte had the ball sixty five yard forward pass to Locke and the touchdown was ours. The game ended with a score of 28 to 0 in favor of the Maroon and White. Over one hundred North Platte people witnessed the game.

CURRENT COMMENT ABOUT PEOPLE AND THE THINGS THEY ARE DOING HERE.

Archie Hood is in town this week visiting his parents Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Hood and with many friends and acquaintances. He is stationed in Mexico now and will return there next week. He reports many interesting things about the country and the people and says that quiet and prosperity is fast returning to that country. Archie likes the work but will probably return to Nebraska next year and complete his University course.

What might have proved a disastrous prairie fire was started on the north side of the river and it swept over several sections before being brought under control. No buildings nor cattle are reported as lost but some valuable winter pasture was destroyed for C. H. Watts and others. No cause for the fire is known unless it was set by hunters, several of which were seen in the vicinity where the fire started, according to reports on the streets here.

The most significant thing about the September monthly report issued by Weatherman Shilling is his statement that we have a deficiency in rainfall of over six inches so far this year. Since the normal is a little over 18 inches, the deficiency is about one-third. In other words, we have only had two-thirds of the average rainfall so far this year. The rainfall for September was one inch. The temperature ran from 95 down to 33. The average temperature so far this year has been four degrees warmer than the average for the past. There were 20 clear days, 5 cloudy and 5 partly cloudy.

A crowded house greeted Mr. Harvey Hindermeyer and the Dann Trio at the Lutheran Church last evening. There were over eight hundred people there and chairs had to be provided for a number after all seats were filled. Mr. Hindermeyer charmed everyone with his fine voice and personality and surprised and pleased when he sang with the Edison re-creation of his

voice. The cornet and violin solos with piano accompaniments, played by the Misses Dann were reproduced by the Edison machine with a striking likeness.
