NATURE STUDY IN OUR CITY PARKS.

RED-SHAFTED FLICKER
 This is a species of woodpecker with red under the wings in the place of yellow which is the color of the commoner flicker found here. The flicker has a bill like a woodpecker and searches in dead or decayed wood for its food which consists of larvae and eggs of insects and the insects themselves. We have often found this bird by the side of the road, busy opening an anthill from which he was extracting the eggs and larvae. The flicker has never been accused of doing any harm to trees but he sometimes gets ambitious and in a spirit of fun as it were, cuts holes in buildings. It is true that he sometimes uses these holes as a refuge in deep winter. The eggs are glossy white and are placed in a hole in a decayed tree. The antics of the flickers at the mating time are really funny and many have written about them. Some of these red-shafted flickers stay here all winter but most of them migrate to the south.
