## DISTRICT COURT OPENS MONDAY

REGULAR OCTOBER TERM CALLED BY JUDGE TEWELL FOR THE THIRTY-FIRST.

District Court will be in session from Monday, Oct. 31 on for an indefinite term. The bar docket has just been printed by this office and shows some 255 cases awaiting action. Judge J. L. Tewell will occupy the bench with Frank Smith as reporter. The jury will be called for next week and the court calendar will be announced on Monday. There are two murder cases, one against Samuel Simmons and the other against Victor Moss. There are forty-one divorce cases on the docket and the usual number of equity, judgment, foreclosure and appeal cases. Twenty-four jurors have been summoned to act when jury cases are up. Quite a number of naturalization cases are before the court and will come up on the same day next week. The docket is the largest ever known in this county and is accounted for by the fact that the April term was postponed on account of the illness of Justice Grimes and so the present docket is an accumulation for almost a year. Local lawyers are very busy getting ready for the big event and some thirty outside attorneys are scheduled to appear if all the cases are called.

### THE BOARD OF HEALTH

At the last session of the State Legislature, a law was passed requiring cities of 5,000 to 20,000 people to organize Boards of Health according to certain rules. These rules were worked over and incorporated into an ordinance which was passed by the North Platte City Council and signed by the Mayor on July 5, 1921. Under the ordinance the Board of Health is composed of the Mayor, who is chairman, the Chief of Police who is secretary and quarantine officer, a physician of the city who is medical advisor, the president of the Council and one other citizen appointed by the Mayor. This gives three ex-officio members and two appointed. The Board of Health as now organized consists of:

E. H. Evans, Mayor.  
E. S. Spillner, Chief of Police.  
Dr. C. A. Selby, City Physician.  
H. B. McMichael, President of the Council.

L. B. Dick, appointed citizen. The Board has power to make regulations to prevent the introduction and spread of contagious, infectious or malignant diseases and to enact rules and regulations to safeguard the health of the people and to prevent nuisances and unsanitary conditions. These rules and regulations have the force and effect of law. The Board is subject to certain restraints and some requirements from Executive Department of the State. No provision is made for financial backing, this being left to the City Council.

## SCOUT SCHOOL OF INSTRUCTION

EIGHT NIGHTS WILL BE GIVEN BY BUSINESS MEN TO SCOUTING COURSE

The first meeting of the School of Scout Instruction which is being planned by the North Platte Council of the Boy Scouts of America will be held at the Franklin Auditorium on Wednesday evening of this week. It is thought that business men and others will be more interested in scouting if they know something of what it is trying to do for the boys. So the school will take these business men and give them a course in the principles and practices of scouting. The course will take eight weeks, one night a week and that night is Wednesday. A program for the course has been worked out by Scout Executive Stephens and each night's program has also been worked out with care. All men in North Platte are invited to attend. The men will be organized into regular scout troops and will be put through the work just as the scouts are required to go through with it. It is not necessary for everyone to be present at each meeting but all are urged to come as often as possible. There is no charge for the course but each is supposed to have a scout handbook costing fifty cents. The opportunity is presented by the Scout Council and it is expected that a large number of men will take hold.
