### FARM BUREAU NEWS SERVICE SUPPLIES ITEMS FOR THE TRIBUNE READERS

Numerous inquiries come to the office of the State Serum Plant at the Agricultural College as to whether Hog Cholera serum and Hog Cholera virus are available to residents of Nebraska, also the price and how to order. Those wishing such information should read the following paragraph carefully:

When Hog Cholera serum or Hog Cholera virus or Black Leg vaccine are desired by any person living in the state of Nebraska, wire, telephone or write the State Serum Plant, College of Agriculture, Lincoln. If you address your correspondence otherwise it may be several days before it reaches the office of the State Serum Plant, which results in much unnecessary delay and inconvenience to you. The price of Hog Cholera serum and virus is one cent per cubic centimeter but the Black Leg vaccine is free. Serum and virus are usually sent by express as only a limited amount of liquid can be sent parcel post, but Black Leg vaccine is sent by mail. All shipment of serum and virus are sent C. O. D. except to County Farm Bureau or other state institutions.

To prune a bearing vine intelligently it is necessary to know the growth and bearing habits of the grape plant. Below are given some of the habits peculiar to the grape which are invaluable in pruning:

Fruits are produced on shoots arising from one year old wood called canes. Not all canes are good producers, medium thick canes with plump rounded buds produce the best and most fruit. The buds on these canes are from 4 to 6 inches apart.

Thick canes with pointed buds from 10 to 12 inches apart are not very productive. Usually this type of cane has laterals on it that are productive and if such a cane must be left these laterals should not be cut off entirely but one or two buds should be left.

The amount of fruit a vine will produce depends on its vigor. Therefore a weak vine is pruned heavier than a strong one, or putting it in another way, more fruiting wood is given a strong vine than a weak one.

A healthy mature vine should produce 10 to 20 pounds of grape. Figuring 3 bunches to the pound, that would mean 30 to 60 bunches. Each healthy bud along the cane is capable of throwing out a shoot that will yield 1 to 4 bunches with an average of 2.

So then from 25 to 35 buds should be left allowing a few extra for those buds which may not produce shoots. Bending, girdling or twisting the cane retards growth and increases fruiting. This principle is used where a vine is unusually vigorous. The fruiting wood or canes may be trained in many different ways.

A common cause of loss is through attempting to winter colonies that are too small. It is somewhat difficult to set a standard for colony strength at this season, but in general it may be stated that it is unwise to attempt to winter colonies that are not strong enough to have brood sufficient to fill three to four Langstroth frames two months before the packing is applied. If the colonies in the apiary are not of the proper strength it is wise to unite until the proper strength is reached. Any uniting should be done at least two weeks before packing. There is a tendency in some localities for colonies to weaken rapidly in early fall, due to the nature of the honey-flow from fall flowers. To some degree this may be offset by putting on the packing earlier than otherwise would be necessary.

It is highly important that each colony have a vigorous queen in order that brood rearing may continue in the fall and may proceed rapidly in the spring. With colonies such as are obtained by the methods here described it is not desirable to keep queens more than two years and it is preferable to requeen the entire apiary every season. To get the best results from requeening all young queens should be introduced so that they will begin laying two months before packing. It will be found that queens wear out more rapidly in the unusually strong colonies obtained by the methods of wintering here described, but every good beekeeper realizes that it is these enormous colonies which get the greatest crops.
