Captain Brown of Pittsburgh, led the subscription list for this building after the death of Mr. Johnston at his home in Pittsburgh. Mr. Johnston had many friends in Wallace and so they dedicated their community hall in honor of him. The site on which the building stands was donated by P. L. Harper of Wallace.

The building is complete in every way and so is its equipment. There is a large kitchen and dining room which have everything necessary. This equipment was all paid for from the subscription money. The banquet which followed the dedication was complete as was the toast list with J. T. Keefe as toastmaster. The singing was led by Lee Carroll and toasts were given by Harry Dixon, W. E. Shuman, E.
