KEARNEY HUB TELLS OF PROGRESS ON NORTH PLATTE-KEARNEY SURVEY.

Following is the present status of the North Platte-Kearney Irrigation Survey which is of interest to Lincoln County readers:

Surveying of the proposed North Platte to Kearney irrigation ditch is already under way, considerable progress having been made during the past two weeks by a force of men, working under direction of Federal Engineer F. F. Smith. Field work was taken over the entire route, both north and south of the Platte and extending as far east as Buda.

A summary of the report made by Engineer Smith, of interest to Hub readers, follows:

"The weather conditions during the month of October were in general favorable for field work, with the exception of two rainy days, October 25 and 26 when no work was accomplished by the field parties. At the end of the month the force consisted of ten field men.

The reconnaissance trip over the lower Platte project by automobile was completed by Project Manager Weiss and F. F. Smith on October 6, the proposed irrigable area being covered from North Platte to Buda, east of Kearney on the north side of the Platte river, and from Kearney to Overton, and from Lexington on to North Platte on the south side. All the important physical features of the project were looked over including most all of the important reservoir sites on both sides of the river. We were accompanied over most of the area by Mr. C. A. Edwards, a local engineer of Gothenburg who is familiar with the country.

"The field organization and the securing of equipment was then undertaken. Owing to the difficulty of securing instrument men it was the twentieth before the first party was put in the field.

"One party of three men started on the topographic surveys of the reservoir sites on the north side, using a plane table. At the end of the month four sites had been surveyed including dam survey and location.

As the feasibility of this project depends primarily on the procuring of the necessary amount of storage, it was thought that these sites should be surveyed with a fair degree of accuracy to enable a close estimate of the cost per acre foot of stored water. The reservoir sites on the north side are numerous, necessitating the survey of about eight or ten to determine that the storage is being obtained at the lowest cost when dam construction and the dependent canal location for feeders is considered. With the data on the controlling elevations and capacities of these reservoirs obtained the favorable locations can then be chosen.

"With the completion of the reservoir surveys the canal location will be started by running control lines between the lines of reservoirs backing the main canal up to the diversion point of the North Platte river.

"Three level parties were started out on October 22, 24 and 31 respectively, accomplishing sixty miles of level line at the end of the month. One party started from four miles south of Brady Island to establish bench marks along part of the main canal and at some of the reservoir sites. The second party started from Lexington carrying levels north to the main canal and thence west establishing bench marks for canal and reservoir surveys. The third party started at Brady, running east, establishing bench marks along the highway to be used for control for the drainage investigations. This party will take up the work of borings, to locate water table and noting soil conditions, on the first of the month."
