EDITORIAL

Who was the first white man to see Lincoln County and tell of his experiences? Read about it in an early issue of the Tribune.

Over in the south part of the county there is said to be a road which is particularly sandy and on which it is very difficult to make good time. Someone posted a sign which read something like this "Go the Limit—All speed regulations are off."

A. B. Lee has been making some nice improvements in the office and salesroom of the General Tire Co., here. During his spare time he has systematized his equipment so that he can take care of the rush which he believes is coming with the resumption of normal business conditions. Confidence in the future of North Platte, Lincoln County and of Western Nebraska is a characteristic of most of our business men and is best expressed by getting ready for the good business which is coming.

From the Attorney General's office comes a ruling which is reported in the state press to mean that thousands of men and women in Nebraska will be barred from voting at the school elections. Under the law, says the opinion, persons without children cannot vote at school elections unless they have \$200 or more personal property which was assessed the last previous year before the election. This applies to elections for school bonds and for school officials. He claims this is the law but others claimed that in cities where the election of members of the Board of Education and voting of school bonds is held at the same time that the regular city election is held, any legal voter could vote. The decision is clear and has the force of the law until overruled by the courts.

We have received a communication from a Lincoln County taxpayer in which he suggests that North Lincoln County is entitled to a representative on the Board of County Commissioners and he suggests that the number of Commissioners be increased to four and one be elected from a district which comprises the part of the county north of the North Platte River. He thinks that part of the county is neglected at times in the matter of roads, culverts, etc. and that the rest of the County is

favored. In his letter, the idea given above is so mixed up with personal and business matters that we thought best to reproduce the thought for the consideration of our readers with the suggestion that any one approving or disfavoring the proposition will send us his idea and let us place it before our readers. Letters will be welcomed and such as we can use will be printed.

A report was started this week that a black list of pupils who did not pay an assessment for the dance held by the Ninth grade last week, had been prepared and was posted in the Junior High School with a remark that those on the list were traitors to the class. We are informed that there is no truth in the report. It is presumed that it started from the fact that a list of the members of the class was prepared and as fast as they paid their assessment for the party their names were crossed off the list. Of course the names remaining were of those who did not pay. The money, we are told, was used to pay for the refreshments and, not for the dance. It is the common practice to raise money for the class parties by assessing each a certain share and only those who pay are expected to come. No other plan has been devised and unless abused this plan usually works out satisfactorily.
