But she is met by this excuse and that excuse and as a result she does not have enough helpers to keep things going. She is not complaining but if about forty ladies or this city would call her up and offer to give one half day each to the campaign, it would make her smile so they could hear it at the State Farm.

We were privileged to know Chas. Crosby. He was a good man and a good citizen. He never let his patriotism and love for his country replace his love for his God and his church as so many others have done. And yet he served his country faithfully and long and at the time of his death he was First Lieutenant Quartermaster in the Reserves. He was a comrad whom the older men of the army loved and admired. With business houses closed and a holiday for labor it must have been a disappointment to those who put on the program, when the hour came and the house was not full. It is said that two thousand people paid 75c each to see the football game in the afternoon and only four hundred could be attracted to the morning exercises which were free. What does it mean?

WATER MAINS TO BE SHUT OFF
The contractor is now putting in the new 6 inch mains and several times in the next three weeks it will be necessary to shut off the water in all that portion of the city west of the 500 block and between the U. P. railroad and First street. There being over 300 consumers in the district it will be impossible to notify each one individually in advance but a half hour's notice will be given each time by blowing the fire whistle the same as for a fire only slower. The water will be shut off each time for from 3 to 5 hours and consumers are requested to take out sufficient water to supply their needs. Water will be shut off in the above district this afternoon, Tuesday, Nov. 15, for about three hours, beginning shortly after 1 o'clock.
