We print the following Call for State Mass Convention as an item of news:

Pursuant to the action of the Independent Progressive Conference held at Lincoln, October 28, 1921. Notice is hereby given, that a State Mass Convention of the independent progressive voters of the state is called to meet at Grand Island, Neb. on Thursday, December 8, 1921, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of organizing and naming a new political party for Nebraska. Every progressive voter in the state is entitled to a seat in this convention and every voter is entitled to a vote.

To insure an adequate number of delegates from each county, Notice is further given, that a county mass convention is hereby called to meet in the court room at the county seat of each county in the state on Saturday, December 3, 1921, at one o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of selecting not less than one delegate for each 400 voters or fraction thereof of the total vote cast for governor in that county at the last election, and such delegation shall consist as nearly as possible of an equal number of men and women, and in addition to the number requested each county may send as many more delegates as possible.

Any progressive voter in the state who does not attend the county mass convention or who may not be selected by such convention as a delegate may come directly to the state mass convention on his own initiative.

ABOUT PEOPLE

County Agent Kellogg advises us that he can locate certified Grimm alfalfa seed in Dawson County and he will be glad to communicate with anyone interested. He says it is well adapted to Lincoln County and no doubt will prove to be a great improvement over what is now being raised here. Let him know the quantity wanted by addressing Box 271, North Platte.

One of our valley farmers has just finished hauling his beet crop from sixty acres of irrigated land. He received over \$65 an acre for the crop. Labor cost him \$22.50 and he paid \$3 for hauling. He took out \$22.50 for his own labor and time and had \$20 an acre left. Is there any other crop which gives as large returns this year? There is said to be thousands of acres of valley land in this county which can be irrigated and produce as large or larger returns than here given.

A press report from Beatrice says that flunkers in the Beatrice High School may be expelled. This has been advised in a number of other schools but we never heard of its being put in practice. School officials should be slow in taking drastic action with boys and girls who take advantage to the full of all the outside activities now provided to distract their minds from the work for which the schools are maintained. Leaders in school life often spend more time and effort on these distractions than upon the school studies. Until we provide more work and less play in the schools it is unbecoming for us to talk of expelling those who do the one at the expense of the other.

Records of local fire departments show that some fires every year are caused by overheated stoves and furnaces. It is easy to turn on the draft and forget about it. In such cases one is fortunate who has taken precautions so that the overheated stove will not start a fire. Metal protection should always be placed under the stoves. This insures safety in one direction. Metal protection should also be placed where ever stoves or furnaces are close to walls or woodwork. This is more often overlooked in the furnace room than in the home heated with a stove. But it is a wise suggestion and one which we are glad to pass on to our readers.

Some people in Lincoln county occasionally express themselves to the effect that the sales being put on this fall by North Platte merchants are fakes. The fact is that there are probably never was a time when so much real value is being sold for such a low price as is true now and during the few weeks just past. The fact that most business men do a large part of their buying on credit and that they must sell

enough to pay the bills when they become due is responsible for their cutting the profits in order to get the money. The unfavorable weather, the low prices of farm products the number of people out of regular employment and other causes have contributed to withhold business and it is by means of special offers and sales that the merchants hope to stimulate trade. There are some business houses which never have sales and these accomplish the same results in another way. It is well for people who want to be careful shoppers to study the advertisements and investigate them before buying.

In the District Court last week at least one man was refused citizenship papers on grounds which are legal but not commonly known. It seems that any foreigner who lived in this country during the last war and who was subject to the draft, who claimed exemption because he was a foreigner, can never become a citizen of this country. In one way that seems to be fair. If he could not go to war when the country needed him he should not be allowed to secure his protection in times of peace. In that way it seems fair. But in another way it was hard on the people because that provision of the law was not known and understood. In the case in question, two men had formed a partnership in business and were starting out in fine shape. They had a stock of goods on hand and unpaid debts. One of the partners went to war and left the other in charge of the business. He was drafted and on his own hook claimed exemption because he was a citizen of one of the countries against which we were fighting. He was anxious to hold up the business while his partner was away. When the war was over, he asked for naturalization. The partner had come back and the business was prospering. He wanted to be an American in name as he had been in heart all of the time. The Judge read the law to him and refused his request.

The first known white men to visit the territory now known as Lincoln County were six French explorers under the leadership of Pierre and Paul Mallet. This was in June 1739, nearly 200 years ago. They probably came up the river from New Orleans and we know they spent the winter of 1738-9 in the vicinity of the mouth of the Niobrara River in the northeast corner of the state. In the spring of 1739 the party started overland for the French settlement at Santa Fe, New Mexico. The report of this trip was sent to the French authorities at New Orleans and forms part of the well-known Margry papers. From the winter camp they traveled south to the Platte which they named and then followed the north bank of the Platte west to the forks where they crossed the river with their pack horses and camped on the 14th day of June on the north bank of the river near the hills which were there. This may have been near where the Experiment Station is now located. During the next three days they traveled south across the high plains where they suffered for wood and water. After many days travel they reached Santa Fe on July 22. These two brothers with their four companions were the first white men to stand on the hills and look over the Platte Valley, probably as far as the site of the present city of North Platte. They talked French and had French clothes and arms. They were also the first to travel over the sand hills and farm lands of the south part of the county. The only results of their exploration was the naming of the Platte river and directing attention of traders and trappers to this part of the new world. The name Mallet does not appear in any part of the state as a name for any of the counties, cities or rivers.
