Secretary Bare of the Chamber of Commerce received a telegram yesterday from Congressman Kincaid in which he announced a decision of the Interstate Commerce commission that an additional 12 1/2 per cent reduction in freight on hay would go into effect on December 27. It seems that thirty days notice must be given to the railroads before such an order becomes effective. It is supposed that this 12 1/2 per cent is in addition to the 10 per cent which was ordered to go into effect on the 20th of this month.

One precaution which we are urged to observe in fire prevention is to have all flues cleaned, examined and repaired at least once a year. A defective flue is the cause of many fires and the only way to prevent such fires

is to keep the flues in good order. One should make certain before putting up the stoves or starting the furnaces in the fall, that the flues are safe. If not certain, call someone who will know. After the fire, one usually tries to excuse himself by saying that he did not know the flue was defective. That is a good excuse but it does not mend the damage done by fire.

After extensive preliminary tests of the soil and moisture conditions on the court house site, it has been decided to use sixteen foot piling under the foundation. Borings showed that a thick layer of hardpan could be reached at that depth and it was decided to have the piling rest on this hardpan. It will take over one hundred piling to support the foundation.

A delegation of men interested in the North Platte-Oberlin Highway met with the County Commissioners of Lincoln County yesterday to make report on the road selected and to get a decision in the matter. It seemed from the discussion that the route has been definitely agreed upon from Oberlin, Kansas to McCook and from there to Maywood. It has been decided that the route is to run south from North Platte to the Votaw school house. The contention arose as to Maywood by what road is known as the east road or go by way of Wellfleet. Arguments were made back and forth by the delegations from the places interested.

C. F. Temple, The Travelers Man

Representatives of the Lincoln County Agricultural society, the Lincoln County Herford Breeders Association, the Farmers' Co-Operative Business Association, the Lincoln County Farm Bureau and the North Platte Chamber of Commerce joined yesterday in a request to the Union Pacific to build two stock loading chutes on the Union Pacific right-of-way near where old stock yards were. The petition cites that these associations have need of facilities for loading and unloading stock for sale and exhibition purposes and that there are no facilities nearer than the new stock yards which are too far away.

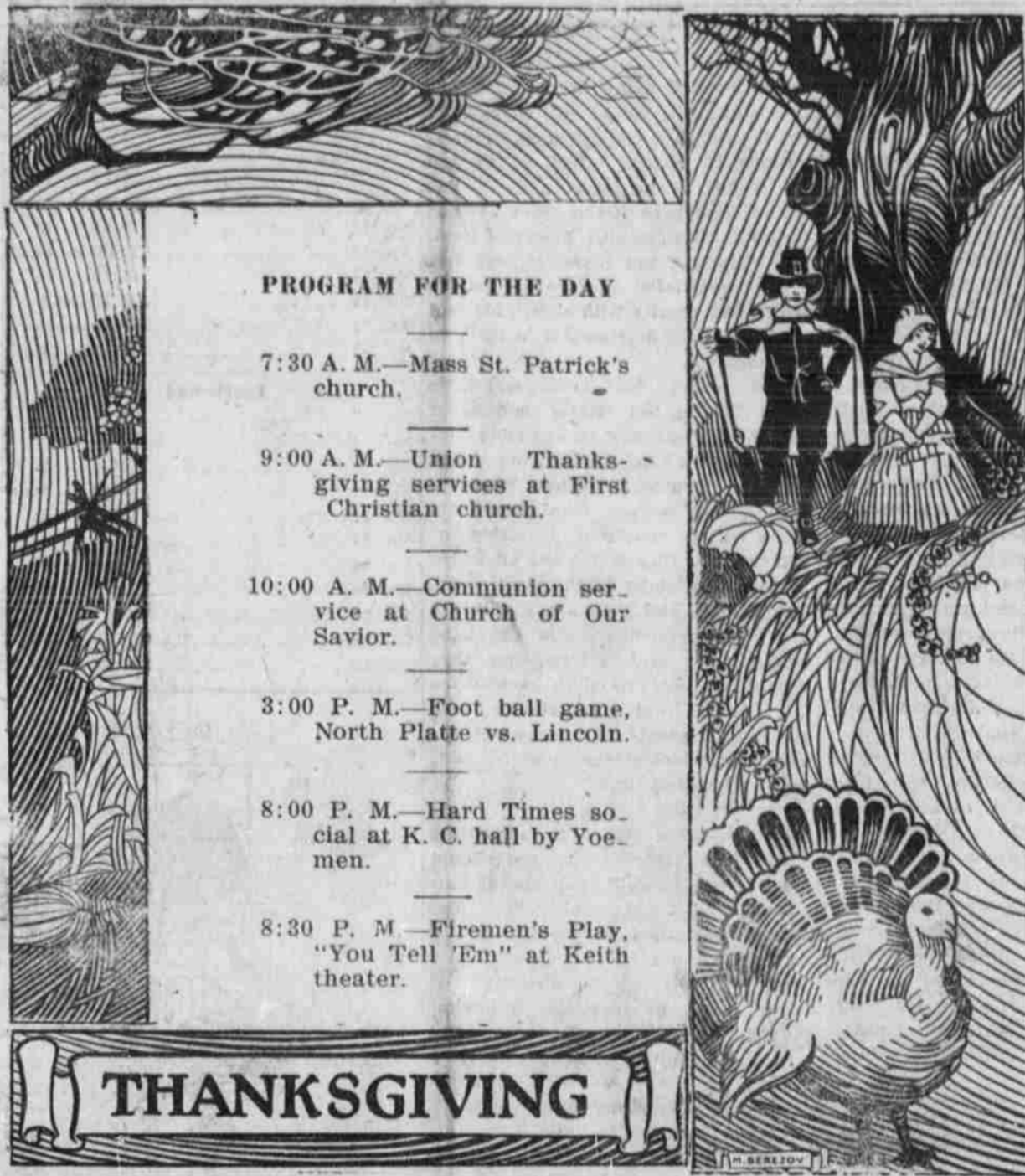

## CHAMPIONSHIP GAME THURSDAY

FOOT BALL FANS TO WITNESS CHAMPIONSHIP GAME ON TURKEY DAY

The defeat of Grand Island by Columbus last Friday leaves Lincoln and North Platte the only contenders for the High School State Championship which will be determined at the Fair Grounds Park here on Thanksgiving day when these two undefeated teams meet in their annual contest. The game should be a thriller if we can judge by comparative scores. Lincoln has played tie games with Grand Island and York and won from Beatrice, Superior, Cambridge and South Omaha. North Platte has defeated Cozad, McCook, Creighton, Ainsley, Gothenburg, Bayard, Columbus and the Curtis Aggies. Columbus beaten by North Platte 16 to 13 in turn defeated Grand Island 7 to 0 and Grand Island played a no score tie with Lincoln. Lincoln defeated South Omaha 14 to 0 while South Omaha was beaten by Columbus 34 to 7. These comparisons would indicate that North Platte has a stronger scoring eleven than Lincoln. On the other hand Lincoln's goal line had been uncrossed until they met Beatrice last week, which game they were lucky to win in the last minutes play 23 to 20. North Platte also was victorious by a narrow margin in the game against Curtis Friday, the Aggie's line being the most powerful the North Platte High school team had ever faced. Time after time the Aggies were able to carry the ball within the 10 yard line only to loose it on downs when the line was supported by secondary defense. North Platte displayed the finest kind of grit and determination against a line that was superior in weight, age and experience and it was these qualities alone that saved them from defeat. Harold Mulligan of Omaha has been agreed upon as referee and Chas. B. Moriarity of same place as umpire. A head lines man has not as yet been selected. The team came through the Curtis game without injury and should be in the best of condition on Thursday. Additional fences are being built to keep the crowd, which is expected to be the largest ever to witness a football game in North Platte, off the field of play. The game will be called promptly at 3 p. m.

It has not been thought that he would be brought to trial during this term of court but the decision was finally reached to call the case this week. It will probably take some time to finish the case and get a verdict.

### INDEPENDENT-PROGRESSIVE CALL COUNTY CONVENTION AT NORTH PLATTE.

Following is the call for a County Mass convention issued by the temporary officers of the new Independent-Progressive Party:

Pursuant to the Call of the new Temporary Executive Committee appointed by the Independent Progressive Conference held at Lincoln, October 28, 1921, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a County Mass Convention of the progressive and independent voters of Lincoln County will be held at the Court House at North Platte Nebraska, on Saturday, December 3, 1921, at one o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of selecting not less than 14 delegates and as many more as possible to attend a State Mass Convention to be held at Grand Island, Nebraska, on Thursday, December 8, 1921, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to organize and name a new political party for Nebraska.
