**HI-Y CONVENTION AT KEARNEY
ATTENDED BY NORTH PLATTE
BOYS**

Following is a report of the district
convention of HI-Y clubs as given in
the Round Up:

A delegation of HI-Y boys left
North Platte on No. 16 and arrived in
Kearney at noon on Friday. After
having dinner in town they proceeded
to the High School where they regis-
tered and were assigned places of
entertainment. Boys from nearly all
the schools from North Platte ex-
tending east of Grand Island attend-
ed the conference. In all there were
nearly two hundred boys in attend-
ance.

No further business was done after
registering until 5:30 Friday evening
when they met and elected a chair-
man for the conference. Again
North Platte was honored when Wil-
bur Swanson was elected chairman.
From the High School the delega-
tions proceeded to the dormitory at
the State Normal where a first class
banquet was held.

After the banquet Mr. Kendall of
Grand Island, the promoter of the
conference led in some songs and
yells. Mr. Wersig, superintendent of
the Kearney schools was toastmaster
and the following responded with
welcomes: Mr. Dryden, "Welcome to
Kearney;" Rev. Warrington, "Wel-
come to the Churches;" Mr. Hobson,
principal of the High School spoke in
behalf of the schools; Harold Relly,
president of the Kearney HI-Y wel-
comed the delegates in behalf of the
Kearney HI-Y. Following the toast
Rev. Koch of North Platte delivered
a very interesting address on "The
Marks of a Man." The following
committees were appointed.
