**CURRENT COMMENT ABOUT PEOPLE AND THE THINGS THEY ARE DOING HERE.**

According to the 1920 census there are 355 farms of over one thousand acres each in Lincoln county. Only one county, Cherry, has more of these 1000-acre farms while seven counties, Cass, Fillmore, Madison, Otoe, Seward, Wayne and York do not have a single 1,000-acre farm. These 355 1,000-acre farms in Lincoln county make for an entirely different condition than obtains in the seven counties. It means long distances, sparse population and wonderful opportunities.

A committee from the Chamber of Commerce consisting of Messrs Bare, Dixon, Carroll, Souder, Thoelecke, Wilson and Barber attended a meeting of farmers at the Gaslin school house Tuesday evening. The object of the meeting was to talk over the irrigation project. It was learned that some of the men there has already subscribed for the west end of the survey which comes up into the eastern side of Lincoln county. The meeting was enthusiastically in favor of irrigation if it can be worked out so it will not be too expensive.

Nebraska Wesleyan University is making a campaign for an endowment fund of one third million dollars. We are writing it out as some people would think it was a printer's mistake if we used the figures. The friends of the university in North Platte have been solicited and the campaign is still on. Word was received at this office yesterday saying that the exact amount in money and pledges in the hands of the treasurer last Saturday was \$796,746.50 and the campaign is just in good form now. The campaign is to close on December 21.

Lincoln county people will be interested in learning of the move being made to secure the appointment of W. R. McKeen to the Interstate Commerce commission. The move is prompted by the need for someone on the commission to represent the middle section of the country. The appointment is to be made by the president and the efforts of Mr. McKeen's friends will be centered on the congressional delegation from Nebraska. Mr. McKeen was with the Union Pacific here at North Platte a number of years ago and has a large acquaintance among the older residents who will be glad to help his candidacy along should opportunity present.

The Sunday edition of the Great Falls Tribune published at Great Falls, contains a page write-up of the University of Montana. This institution includes the state university, the normal college, the school of mines and the engineering school. These four schools combined constitute the University of Montana of which Edward C. Elliott is chancellor and head. North Platte people know him as Ed Elliott born and raised here a graduate of North Platte High school and of the University of Nebraska. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Elliott, are now living at 421 East Second street in this city. In the paper referred to is a detailed description of each of the four schools and the following item of interest to Mr. Elliott's North Platte friends: "The unification of the administration of the University of Montana has made possible the singleness of purpose which underlies the specific work of each one of the institutions. The head of the University of Montana under the present administrative system of Chancellor Elliott, whose office is in the state capital at Helena. The faculty organization of each institution is independent, but the work of the four university institutions is co-ordinated through the office of the chancellor. Montana's experiment in this form of administration of the affairs of segregated institutions has attracted wide attention in educational circles

in this country. That it has been a success to a degree far greater than was anticipated by its earlier administration, the financial affairs of the University of Montana have been systematized and handled under strictly administered budget system. To the chancellor's energy and foresightedness may be attributed the growing popularity of the greater University of Montana. This was evidenced emphatically by the vote which passed the university fund measures in the autumn of 1919."
