Sup't C. L. Littell announced today that the enrollment of the City Schools last Friday was 1834 while a year ago it was 1685. This shows an increase of 157 pupils.

C. L. Kelley of Evanston, Wyo., was a city visitor this week. He was a boy in North Platte and attended school here, leaving about 22 years ago for Florida. He had not been back to North Platte since and his visit this week was interesting to him in several ways. He said the Lloyd Opera house, the Catholic church and the county court house are about all the buildings that he can recognize. He found it easier to recognize those who were men than those who were boys and have grown to manhood since he left. He spoke highly of the appearance of the city and of its substantial growth.

Contrary to the prevailing opinion, the Lincoln County board of county commissioners will appoint a building inspector to look after the construction of the new county court house. This was decided at a meeting held yesterday. At this meeting a resolution was passed and spread upon the minutes, appointing Monday, December 19 as the time when this appointment will be made. There is some talk of employing someone from out

of the county but the sentiment of the members of the board seems to be in favor of appointing a home man if such can be secured. The commissioners want a man who can read blue prints and knows what is what about building but most of all they want a man who will stand on what he thinks is right. The board hesitated about the matter because of its confidence in the integrity and honesty of the contractors but it realized that it would be relieved from many annoying complaints and caring for many details if an inspector were secured and so it adopted that policy.

LOCAL BOY SCOUT CHORUS SINGS AT NOON LUNCHEON OF ROTARIANS

Twelve boy scouts picked from the different troops of the city appeared before the Rotary club Monday noon at its weekly luncheon and gave a demonstration of scout activities. R. D. Birge has been going around from troop to troop and giving the scouts training in singing and he selected twelve to experiment with on the Rotarians. The experiment proved a success and the boys were encouraged. They also gave an exhibition of signaling and of bandaging. The applause was hearty and prolonged.

EXPERIMENT STATION ENTERS HENS IN NATIONAL EGG-LAYING CONTEST

Robert H. Jandebauer, poultryman at the North Platte experimental station sent ten white leghorn hens to the Nebraska National egg-laying contest which is being held at the state farm at Lincoln. These were pure bred pullets ready to lay. The contest started November 1. At the end of the first month this pen held fifth place, laying 110 eggs in 30 days. Two hens were awarded blue ribbons for producing more than twenty eggs each. One produced 23 and the other 22 during the first month. This is considered as a very good record right after the birds were shipped and placed in strange quarters. The contest lasts one year and each month we will get reports on the standing of the North-Platte hens.

LINCOLN COUNTY HAD DELEGATES TO THE MASS CONVENTION
