THE LIGHTED CHRISTMAS TREE MAY BECOME A HORROR

State Fire Marshal C. E. Hartford has sent out the following warning which is worthy of notice:
At Christmas time, many people are so engrossed with the idea of entertainment and amusement for their children that they are forgetful of the dangers that accompany these entertainments.
Picture the family reunion, gathered around the annual Christmas tree, children and grandchildren, nieces, nephews, cousins and all; the tree with its many decorations, its lighting effects, its imitation snow, tinsel, the presents for all and Santa Claus with his white locks and flowing beard, when suddenly a flash and the fiend—fire—appears. Someone has been careless and the accident occurs and some little fellow hopelessly scarred or possibly will lose his life. That happy scene is changed without warning to one of sorrow and despair. There is a Christmas horror which is forever burned into the memory and hearts of those who only a short time before were so happy and gay.

Lighted candles on trees, tinsel and celluloid decorations, make a dangerous combination, for the Christmas tree. Also, dried holly or mistletoe on gas or electric light fixtures, may be cause of a holiday blaze. Do not leave the lighted tree a moment. The moderately cheap candle burns rapidly, sheds paraffin down the sides and soon bows over. This exposes more wick and creates a larger flame and it is but a moment until the taper-bearing branches are but a pillar of fire. Do not have the lights so low the dresses of children can come in contact with them. All Christmas tree decorations should be fireproof. Under no circumstances use cotton cloth or flannel in Santa Claus costumes. If you cannot afford to have your Christmas tree lighted by electric lights it is more advisable not to light it at all but have someone install them who knows how to install them correctly.
